COVINGTON PLANS WORK

(From Farm Bureau News)
Covington precinct committee met on the evening of February 17, to decide on the projects to be worked out this year. With Mrs. John Bobier as leader of the poultry work, two demonstrations in the control of parasites and diseases and two culling demonstrations will be conducted. The remodeling of poultry houses will also be made a feature this year.
Being a trucking section, many horticultural problems are to be solved this year. Demonstrations in the spraying and pruning of fruit trees and the spraying of potatoes will be under the leadership of John Sohr.
Potato improvement by hill selection will be conducted for the community on the John Bobier farm. Demonstrations in the use of dust sprays for melons will be under the supervision of H. F. Tebbens. This is a new form of spray which has worked successfully in southern states. The establishing of a city market for garden truck will be undertaken this year. A meeting with Mr. George R. Boomer to discuss this subject will be held on March 17th. Mr. E. L. Iden is leader of this project.
Gopher control was considered an important piece of work for the year. A pest district will be organized with a drive to be made in both spring and fall.
With Mrs. John Bobier as leader, food preparation will be a part of the women's project this year. The vegetable canning demonstration will be conducted and at least five families will be secured to keep food calendars and work out food selection projects.
The project on household conveniences will be directed by Mrs. E. L. Iden. It is planned to have one demonstration on labor-saving devices and to remodel at least one unsatisfactory kitchen.

W. F. B. CLUB

Another club was organized at the home of Mrs. J. C. Goodfellow at Jackson, February 15, to carry on the home activities of the Farm Bureau. Miss Mary Moore was elected St. John's precinct director of the Farm Bureau to fill the vacancy left by Mrs. Goodfellow's resignation from the board. Mrs. M. R. Boler was elected president; Mrs. J. C. Goodfellow, vice president and Miss Beatrice Jones, secretary and treasurer of the club.
The club elected Miss Jones as a delegate to the dress construction school to be held at Hubbard, February 28, March 1, 2 and 3. Miss Jones will assist in conducting a dress construction school for the women wishing to attend in Jackson. Mrs. Hill will be sent as a delegate to the millinery school later in the spring.

Libraries from the Nebraska Library Commission have been located in the following communities of the county: Combs district, Omaha precinct, Piddler Creek, Naconda, Emerson and Dakota City. The problem of reading in the farm home is especially felt at this time of year when one has time to read but has not an access to a library. Subscriptions of magazines are high and many homes have found it necessary to discontinue subscriptions for awhile. Often we hear the cry of a housekeeper of "what will she do with the old magazines that are too good to throw away and she hasn't any place to store them." Why not exchange with the neighbors and increase the supply of reading material.

NOTICE OF ELECTION OF DAKOTA CITY DRAINAGE DISTRICT.

Notice is hereby given that a petition for the formation of a drainage district, under the name of "Dakota City Drainage District," was filed with the board of county commissioners of Dakota County, Nebraska, in the office of the clerk of Dakota County, under the provisions of Article 5, Chapter 19, of the Revised Statutes of Nebraska (Ed. 1913), being Sections 1866 to 1914 inclusive, entitled:

"An act to provide for drainage districts to drain wet land; and land subject to overflow; and any land which will be improved by drainage; to build dykes and levees; to construct, straighten, widen, deepen, or alter any ditch, drain, stream, or water course, to riprap or otherwise protect the bank of any stream or ditch; to construct, enlarge, extend, improve or maintain any system of control of surface water or running water; and the rights, obligations and powers of such corporations, including the power of eminent domain, the creation of debts, issuing of negotiable bonds, and the levying of special assessments on such real estate and easements therein as may be benefited by such public work, and defining the duties and powers of public officials; and the amendments thereto, and the said board of county commissioners of Dakota County, Nebraska, in acting on said petition, has fixed the boundaries of said proposed district and has established said district in accordance with the aforesaid act and amendments thereto, as follows, to-wit:

That said district shall be bounded as follows:
Commencing at a point on the Nebraska-Iowa state boundary line directly east of the northeast corner of section thirty-four (34), an extension of the north boundary of fractional section thirty-five (35), in township twenty-nine (29), range nine (9), east, in Dakota County, Nebraska; and running thence west along the north line of said fractional section thirty-five (35), and section thirty-four (34), to the northwest corner of said section thirty-four (34), to the southwest corner of the northwest quarter (NW 1/4) thereof; thence west through the center of section thirty-three (33), to the southwest corner of the southwest quarter (SW 1/4) of said section thirty-three (33), in said township and range, and the west line of section four (4), in township twenty-eight (28), range nine (9), east, to the southwest corner of the northwest quarter (NW 1/4) of said section four (4); thence west through sections five (5), and six (6), to the northwest corner of the southwest quarter of the northwest quarter (SW 1/4) of NW 1/4 of section six (6), of said township twenty-eight (28), range nine (9), east; thence continuing west through sections one (1), and two (2), township twenty-eight (28), range eight (8), east, to the southwest corner of the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter (NW 1/4 of NW 1/4) of said section two (2); thence south along the west boundary of said section two (2), and of sections eleven (11), fourteen (14), twenty-three (23), twenty-six (26), and thirty-five (35), in said township and range, to the southwest corner of said section thirty-five (35); thence east one-half mile to the southeast corner of the southwest quarter (SW 1/4) of said section thirty-five (35); thence south through the center of section two (2), township twenty-seven (27), range eight (8), east, to the southwest corner of the southeast quarter (SE 1/4) of said section; thence east along the south line of sections two (2), and one (1), in said township and range, and along the south line of section six (6), in township twenty-seven (27), range nine (9), east, and along the south boundary of section five (5), in said township and range, to the center of the channel of Omaha creek; thence northerly up the center of the channel of said Omaha creek, to the point where it intersects the "old high bank" of the Missouri river, in the southwest quarter of the northwest quarter (SW 1/4 of NW 1/4) of section five (5), in said township and range; thence northerly along the Old High Bank of the Missouri river, through the northwest quarter (NW 1/4) of said section five (5), township twenty-seven (27), range nine (9), east, and through section thirty-two (32), township twenty-eight (28), range nine (9), east, to the north line of said section thirty-two (32); thence east to the said boundary line between the states of Nebraska and Iowa; thence northerly along said state boundary line to the place of beginning, all in Dakota County, Nebraska.

Said district embraces land exclusively within the county of Dakota, Nebraska.
Said board of county commissioners has ordered that the affairs of said district shall be managed by a board of seven directors and that each director give a bond in the penal sum of \$1,000.00.

An election will be held in accordance with the provisions of the statute and amendments thereto herein referred to, in the court room in Dakota City, Nebraska, between the hours of 8 o'clock in the forenoon and 6 o'clock in the afternoon, on the 3rd day of March, 1922, at which election the question of the formation of said district shall be determined by the votes of the owners of land in said district, and a board of seven directors elected, said directors to take office contingently on the formation of said district.
