CALL FOR DELEGATE CONVENTION.

The democratic state central committee has issued the following call through Chairman P. L. Hall and Secretary G-W. Phillips:

The democratic electors of the state of Nebraska are hereby called in delegate convention at the city of Omaha, Wednesday, June 1, 1904, at 2 o'clock, p. m. for the purpose of electing four delegates-at-large and four alternate delegates-at-large, and twelve district delegates and twelve alternate district delegates, each congressional district in the state being entitled to two district delegates and two alternate district delegates, said delegates to represent the democratic party of Nebraska in the democratic national convention to be held in St. Louis, Mo., July 6, 1964.

The several counties of the state will be entitled to one delegate to said state convention and in addition thereto one delegate for each 100 votes, or major election of 1903 for Hon. John J. Sullivan, for supreme judge.

Box Butte county, under this ratio, will be entitled to six delegates.

It is recommended by the state central committee that in all cases where counties select a new county committee in the year 1904 that said county committee be named at the first county convention held.

It further recommended that no proxies be allowed at said state convention, county which he seeks to represent.
