SCHOOL NOTES.

Examinations for Eighth grade and Normal certificates will be held in Hemingford April 26th and 27th and in Alliance April 21st and 22nd at the Superintendents office.

A well attended and well rendered entertainment marked the close of school in the Evans district last Friday. Miss Anna Nerdud was the teacher. The Hemingford school board would do well to watch the work of teachers like Miss Nerdud, so as to give Box Butte teachers who demonstrate a talent for teaching an opportunity.

The Junior Normal will again be held in Alliance, the term beginning early in June that the session may be over before the extreme warm weather. This gives the teachers the opportunity to continue the studies begun during the last year's Normal, and to again have the benefit of the practical school. A large attendance is hoped for, all teachers being expected to attend.

A new law passed by the recent Legislature is of interest to teachers and is as follows:

House roll No. 48, by Warner of Lancaster, to provide for a more uniform system for the certification of teachers. Certificates shall be of three classes—state, county and city—and the two former shall be divided into three grades. The state superintendent shall prepare questions for the examination of applicants for state or county certificates and prescribe the rules and regulations for such examinations. He shall also examine, mark and file, or cause the same to be done under his direction and supervision, all answer papers and may appoint a committee of three to assist him for that purpose. Approved March 30.

The public school in districts No. 15 and 46 closed last Friday and an enter-

tainment was given under the direction of the teachers, Misses Cecil and Natalie Wilkinson, ably assisted by the patrons of the school. The ladies of the neighborhood provided a splendid dinner, which was enjoyed by the pupils and visitors. In the afternoon an excellent program was rendered by the pupils of both schools. The walls of the room were covered with specimens of the childrens' work, from the primary grade work to the examination papers of the ninth grade latin and bore the marks of careful training and conscientious labor. Much credit is due to the teachers, pupils and parents who, by the interest taken in the work, have made these schools so successful this winter.
