New Telephone Company.

W. R. Kent of Long Lake, John and Herman Krause and a number of other prominent ranchmen as well as a number of Alliance people including Norton, Hampton, Spry, Noleman, Rumer, Holstein and others, are organizing a stock company to erect, maintain and operate a telephone line between here and Long Lake and Luella, where they will connect with the Elkhorn line as well as to connect here with the Alliance exchange, giving the ranchmen an outlet, both north and south and add to the efficiency of the local service. The polls and wire have been ordered and an order for instruments will be placed in time to have them on hand when the line is completed. It is proposed to include about fifteen ranches on the circuit between here and Luella.

STOCKMEN CONVENE

Executive Committee Meets and Sets the Dates for the Annual Meeting June 1 and 2.

Friday afternoon the executive committee of The Nebraska Stock Growers Association, met at the office of R. M. Hampton in the first national bank, and set a date for the annual meeting. To be held in Alliance June 1st and 2nd at the Phelan opera house. Fully five hundred stockmen from all over the west will be here.

The executive committee present were John Adams of Potter, Nebr., president, E. M. Searle Jr., secretary of state, and secretary of the association, A. M. Modisett, Rushville, E. E. Lowe, Hyannis, E. P. Myers, Lena, W. G. Comstock, Ellsworth, A. A. Kinkaid, Hyannis, John Brennan, R. A. Hampton, and A. S. Reed of Alliance, L. P. Smith, Mitchell, W. L. Ashbrooke and Wall Reed of Sioux county.

R. M. Hampton and Dr. Knight were appointed as a committee on program and arrangements, which assures the best. The executive committee was fortunate in having Dr. L. Clarke, government inspector, present, who talked to the committee on best methods of dipping, and could not recommend the use of crude oil for a dip. He will be one of the speakers at the June meet, and will discuss the dipping question then in detail.

Sam Cowan of Ft. Worth, Texas, will be here. He is the man who gained a national prominence by being the instigator of the interstate commerce law, and is one of the prominent cattle men of America today. Dr. Peters and Prof. Barnett of the state university will be here and others of national fame will be at the meeting. The program will appear later.

Rhodes Successor Appointed.

The Burlington changes here as reported in last week's HERALD will become effective May 1st as per official bulletin of G. W. Holdredge. Mr. Rhodes resignation becomes effective May 1st and Mr. Phelan will move up. Mr. Harris will succeed Mr. German as secretary to the General Superintendent and Mr. Birdsell succeeds Mr. Phelan. George Burke is slated to succeed Mr. Harris as chief clerk to the division superintendent, but no confirmation of it can be had at headquarters. Mr. Murphy will take the Deadwood end of the line as successor to Mr. Birdsell. Mr. Murphy has been roadmaster of the Hill's division for some years and the duties of his office will be added to. He will be the division superintendent without the title. The changes seem to be meeting with general approval.

The City Hospital.

Dr. H. H. Bellwood returned from Chicago, yesterday, after an absence of some three weeks, and now says he is ready to take up the work of procuring the funds with which to build the new hospital. In speaking of endorsements from eastern capitalists, he says he thinks there will be no trouble after we once get started here, and he thinks that with from \$5,000 to \$8,000 subscribed here, there would be no trouble about securing a like amount east.

Sam Reck, the contractor and architect, is at work now drawing a set of plans for a hospital building that will accommodate thirty-five patients, with two stories and a basement that can be built for \$8,000. The plans will be put on exhibition as soon as completed.
