"Cattle in the infected area, that have not been dipped shall only be al lowed shipment for slaughter and cer tificates must bear notation, viz: 'Un-Burk, are now located. Whittier is a dipped cattle for slaughter only. Must beautiful little city fourteen miles south- not be diverted to feed lots.

The infected area includes all of Nebraska; that part of Wyoming situated east of Rawlins, tributary to the Union Pacific, Chicago & North-Western, Colorado & Southern, and Guernsey branch of the B. & M. railways, and that part of Colorado indicated in state regulations.
