Irrigation Information.
We have received from the Burling-

The Shoshone project covers an
equal area in the Big Horn Basin ad-

The Crow reservation covers half a
million acres, when that reservation is
opened in 1906 or 1907. The Belle
Fourche project covers a large terri-
tory north of the Black Hills. Copies

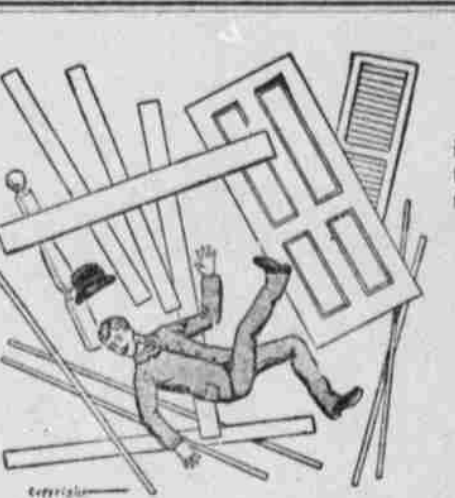
