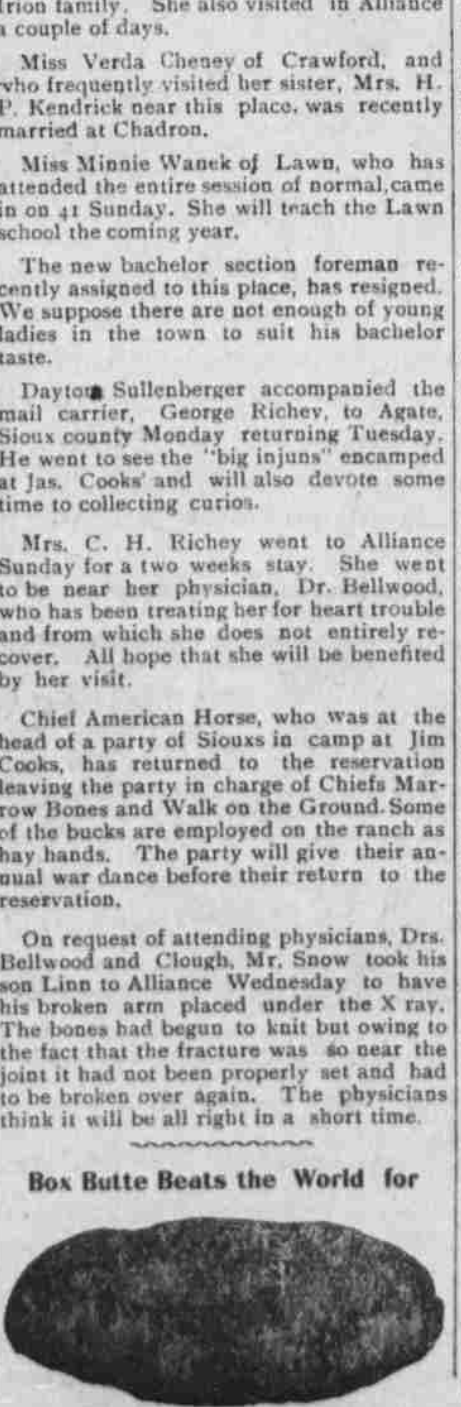
MARSLAND.
