PASSES MONEY BILL

FILIBUSTER AGAINST CURRENCY MEASURE FAILS.

Speaks for Eighteen Hours and Forty-Three Minutes-Money Bill Becomes a Law-Public Building Bill Is Passed-Burkett Explains Coup.

The senate session will be memorable on account of the filibuster of LaFollette, Stone and Gore against the emergency currency bill, the remarkable interpretations of the rules which go far to establish closure in a body noteworthy for the freedom of debate and by the Inal passage of the currency bill. LaF.dette broke the record as a long distance speaker, having spoken for eighteen hours and fortythree minutes.

The passage of the government employes' liability bill and the adoption of the conference reports on the public buildings and the deficiency appropriation bills immediately followed final action on the Aldrich-Vreeland compromise on the currency measure.

To those who gave close attention to the events in the senate during the filibuster which marked the closing of the session, the change in the interpretation of the senate rules was considered of far greater import than the fillbuster itself. Senator Burkett (Neb.), who gave close attention to the parliamentary tactics employed by the majority to bring the obstruction to an end, thus summarized the changes which were accomplished:

First-The vice president announced that it was within the province of the chair to count a quorum and that he would not order a roll call if a quorum was actually present.

Second-The senate, by a vote upon a point of order, submitted to it by the vice president, determined that the question of "no quorum" could not be raised until after intervening business if the previous roll call had disclosed a quorum present and that debate was not such intervening business

Third-A rule of the senate which in practice had always lain dormant was invoked, prohibiting a senator from addressing the senate upon any question more than twice in any one day.

The result of these three interpretations of the rules make it absolutely impossible to prolong debate indefinitely and thus makes a filibuster impossible where the end of the session is indeterminate. By refusing to adjourn and thus continuing the same day until the legislation shall be enacted, it is only a matter of time until any filibustering contingent can be successfully worn out,

Dr. Koch made a most careful examination of the settlement, taking many notes on what he saw and questioning many of the unfortunates, but was reticent in expressing himself except on the general conduct and condition of the camp. As to the scentific treatment of the dread disease, whether a permanent cure might be discovered as a result of experiments now being made by scientists, he declined to be quoted.

"I visited the settlement," said Dr. Koch, "principally to learn three things, namely, the method of administration, the contentment and surroundings of the lepers and whether climatic, racial or other conditions resulted in special forms of development of the disease. As a result of my visit I found the type of disease the same as that existing in loper stations of other countries which I have visited. The buildings, general arrangements and equipment compare favorably with those existing in the great leper stations in other parts of the world. I consider the patients



termittently for more than 120 years, the Yaqui nation, as a nation, is about to suffer the threes of dissolution, to sever tribal relations and its members are to settle down into peaceable and law-abiding Mexican citizens. Originally numbering twenty thousand or more people, they have never yet acknowledged the authority of the Mexican government, but the end is fast coming and the Yaqui nation will soon be a thing of the past. Although Christianized by the Spanish fathers, they steadfastly refused to accept the dominion of Spain and as soldiers in the revolutionary army materially aided in driving the Spaniards from the country and in later years against the armies of the republic they stubbornly maintained their freedom. Beaten by armies in the field, they retreated to the mountains of Bacatete, and waged unrelenting guerrilla warfare. Quarter was neither asked nor given and the innocent on both sides suffered with the guilty. When exhausted by long struggles, there have been intervals of peace, but under the then existing conditions these could not be lasting, and the first overt act on the part of the Indians or the government led to other bloody and determined struggles.

EIGHT CONSECRATED BISHOPS

Impressive Services at Methodist Conference in Baltimore.

The most impressive moment of the Methodist Episcopal general conference at Baltimore was when Bishop Henry W. Warren, placing his hands on the head of Dr. William F. Anderson of New York, pronouncedthe solemn words that made the kneeling minister a bishop of the church.

The Lyric, in which the consecration service was held, was crowded to the very limit of its capacity. In the rooms reserved for the use of the bishops a procession was formed and it moved out on the stage, led by the bishops-elect, Rev. Drs. William F. Anderson of New York, John L. Neulsen of Berea, O.; William A. Quayle of Chicago, Charles L. Smith of Pittsburg; Wilson S. Lewis of Sloux City, Ia.; Edwin H. Hughes of Greencastle, Ind.; Robert McIntyre of Los Angeles, Cal., and Frank M. Bristol of Washington, D. C., each accompanied by his two presenters.

Following these came Bishops Warren and Goodsell and the other consecrating bishops, the first named as senior bishop presiding and acting as chief consecrator. The candidates for ordination were examined by Bishop Warren, who pronounced them eligible and this was followed by the declarations and oaths of the candidates.

Then, after another brief prayer, Bishop Warren pronounced the words of consecration over Rev. Dr. Anderson and other bishops performed the same office for the other candidates.

Second Series of Storms in Oklahoma.






Are Irregular.




