**NOTICE OF INCORPORATION
OF THE
FREEMAN CATTLE COMPANY**

1. The name of this corporation shall be The Freeman Cattle Company.
2. Its principal place of business shall be at Ellsworth, Sheridan county, Nebraska.
3. The general nature of the business to be conducted shall be the buying and selling of cattle and other live stock, and the production of the same for the market and sale. Also to hold, purchase, sell and mortgage real estate.
4. The amount of capital stock authorized is Fifty Thousand Dollars, divided into shares of One Hundred Dollars each, of which at least Twenty Thousand Dollars shall be paid in at the time of commencement of business.
5. The corporation shall begin business on the 11th day of May, 1908, and shall continue for a period of twenty years, unless sooner dissolved by a majority of three-fifths of the stock.
6. The highest amount of indebtedness for which this corporation shall be liable at any one time shall not exceed two-thirds of the capital stock.
7. The affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a board of directors consisting of three persons who shall be stockholders in the corporation and who shall serve for a term of one year, or until their successors in office are elected.

CIRCUS STUNTS

Delight People of all Ages, Sexes and Conditions.

All California enjoyed the Sells-Floto parade and show and all the notices are good ones.

The Pasadena, Cal., Daily Star says: The Sells-Floto parade was up to the true circus specifications from brightly clad and somewhat highly powdered ladies who, mounted on snowwhite steeds led the procession, to the calliope emitting thick smoke like a locomotive, which brought up the rear.

All were there with the glad habiliments—the equestriennes, the Sengambian band, the Jap acrobats and the Hibernian orchestra elevated high on gilded pedestals. Everybody in town was there to enjoy the tinsel. Hundreds stood on the hot curbs an hour or more to feast their eyes on an institution that is deeply rooted alike in the hearts of old and young America. The parade did not include all the good things that are housed under the canvas, but it gave a taste which left an appetite for more.

The menagerie was well represented, tigers from India and lions from Africa pacing their cages restlessly and looking with disapproval upon the throng on the sidewalks. A dozen camels swung lazily down the street, apparently not caring whether they placed a foot on burning sands or hot pavements, while six elephants jostled along under the guidance of their riders bidding defiance to trolley cars and autos.

The parade was the best seen in Pasadena in a long time and the crowd that flocked to the show this afternoon showed its faith in the circus.

The Los Angeles Herald says: The rare combination of school vacation and circus is playing to the interests both of circus folk and juveniles—although it takes more than school to keep the average boy away from the circus. Big crowds followed with bated breath the hair-raising horrors of the knife-throwing trio; the performing elephants took the children by storm; and the grown-up boys "didn't care" if they did watch mam'selle on the horses or trapeze. Altogether, it's a great show that the Sells-Floto people are offering.

Possibly the highest honors of the day are due the elephants which, under the training of Herr Chris Zeitz, perform stunts that are truly wonderful. The huge, cumbersome beasts manage to go through the evolutions of a two-step with little less awkwardness than the average beginner at dancing school.

Among the flying population of the show the Seigrist family rank high, doing some wonderful aerial stunts. The two Ty-Bell sisters ascend on a huge ball which begins to revolve while they hang to it with their teeth and do fancy skits in midair. A godly lot of Japanese trapeze performers and contortionists show some remarkable acts, and one of their countrymen does a stunt on the rope, sliding down on his hands, that causes the hair to assume a perpendicular position.

Two rings, a central stage and a hippodrome furnish sights for the entire audience. The side shows are there in all their glory of paint and din.
