When the local freight going east yesterday morning pulled out of the Alliance yards at eight o'clock in charge of Conductor Gaddis, no one thought that within a few hours one of the train crew would meet with an accident causing his instant death. It is impossible at this writing to ascertain the exact facts in the case, but as nearly as can be learned some switching was being done at Ellsworth when Brake-man Floyd E. Watson, the victim of the accident, was caught by the engine attached to two cars and run over, resulting in his instant death. News of the accident was immediately wired to Alliance. The remains arrived on No. 43 and were taken in charge by Undertaker Darling.

The deceased resided in West Lawn with his father, Francis M. Watson, and three brothers, Elijah, George and Lucian. He was a faithful employe of the Burlington, was well liked by his associates by whom his demise will be sincerely mourned as well as by his relatives.

Funeral will be tomorrow at 2:30 p.m. from his late residence in West Lawn, and will be in charge of the I. O. O. F. of which he was a member.
