He was too late to be with his son at the end, for death had relieved him of his suffering.

Deceased was 28 years old last November and came to Wyoming six years ago. He had a large number of friends here. The body has been embalmed and the father will start with it tomorrow to have it buried beside his mother and sister at Alliance.
