This was followed by another encore, the orchestra then playing an overture, "On the Farm," which was very appropriate as it was followed by an address by Prof. Hunt, who is conducting the experimental agricultural work here. The professor is an old-time pedagogue and spoke of the aim of the teacher not being so much to reach perfection in memorizing the multiplication table as to acquire "manliness and womanliness" among her pupils.

Chancellor Avery, of the Nebraska State university then addressed the students, his subject being, "Observations on the German School." This address was full of interest, the chancellor showing that while the Germans might criticize American education as being "lots of it, but not very deep," that in the German institutions there was a great loss, the slower pupils being sacrificed for those of quicker and brighter intellects.
