County Fair Premium List

The premium list for the Box Butte county fair, to be held Sept. 21, 22 and 23, is being printed this week. The list of premiums is much larger than that of last year, and we suppose the largest yet offered by any fair in northwestern Nebraska. Not including purses for the races and special premiums, there are 803 first premiums, 803 second premiums, and 56 articles on which only one premium, a diploma, are offered, making a total of 1,662 premiums. These are divided into thirteen classes, as follows:

Tash, supt.; Class I, Flowers, Mrs. L. H. Highland, supt.; Class J, Needle and Fancy Work, Mrs. W. E. Cotant, supt.; Class K, Machinery, etc., L. N. Worley, supt.; Class L, Discretionary, Mrs. Dr. Churchill, supt.; Class M, School Work, Miss Delia M. Reed, supt.
