

### ARIZONA BULLETIN

#### Report from Phoenix Board of Trade

An increase of \$1,925,637.89 or 12 per cent in one year makes the total assessed valuation of property in Maricopa county in 1910 \$17,940,167.42.—A company has been organized in Phoenix to erect a \$250,000 fireproof hotel, the work of clearing the ground has commenced .- Commissioners of Territorial Fair have opened offices, schedule of prizes totalling \$60,000 offered for annual November event. -Fish and Game Commission has arranged to stock with fish the Roosevelt Reservoir, a lake 25 miles in area. - Owners of 24,000 acres of land outside the Roosevelt Project have asked to have their lands and works added to the Salt River Valley scheme.-Filing a trust deed to secure \$40,000,000 of bonds to Farmers Loan and Trust Co. of New York evidences the progress intended by various combined railroad lines in Arizona. -Recent decision making a reduction of 30 per cent in freight rates to Arizona to go into effect October 1st will stimulate trade

Sample of the early crops in Arizona: the Glendale sugar factory has received 25,000 tons of beets this reason, hauling closed July 21. Outside of Arizona beet hauling is only commencing.—Subdivision of large tracts in Salt River Valley is noted, 11,967 acres have been added to the small areas since April. This is more than the area subdivided during the entire preceding year, a splendid endorsement of the Roosevelt Project.—Farmers of Salt River Valley are to erect power plants to produce 10,000 horse-power, an assessment of \$2.25 per acre for two years will pay the cost of construction, \$1,000,000, after which time profit will result to land owner and water user. -Territorial and National Banks


