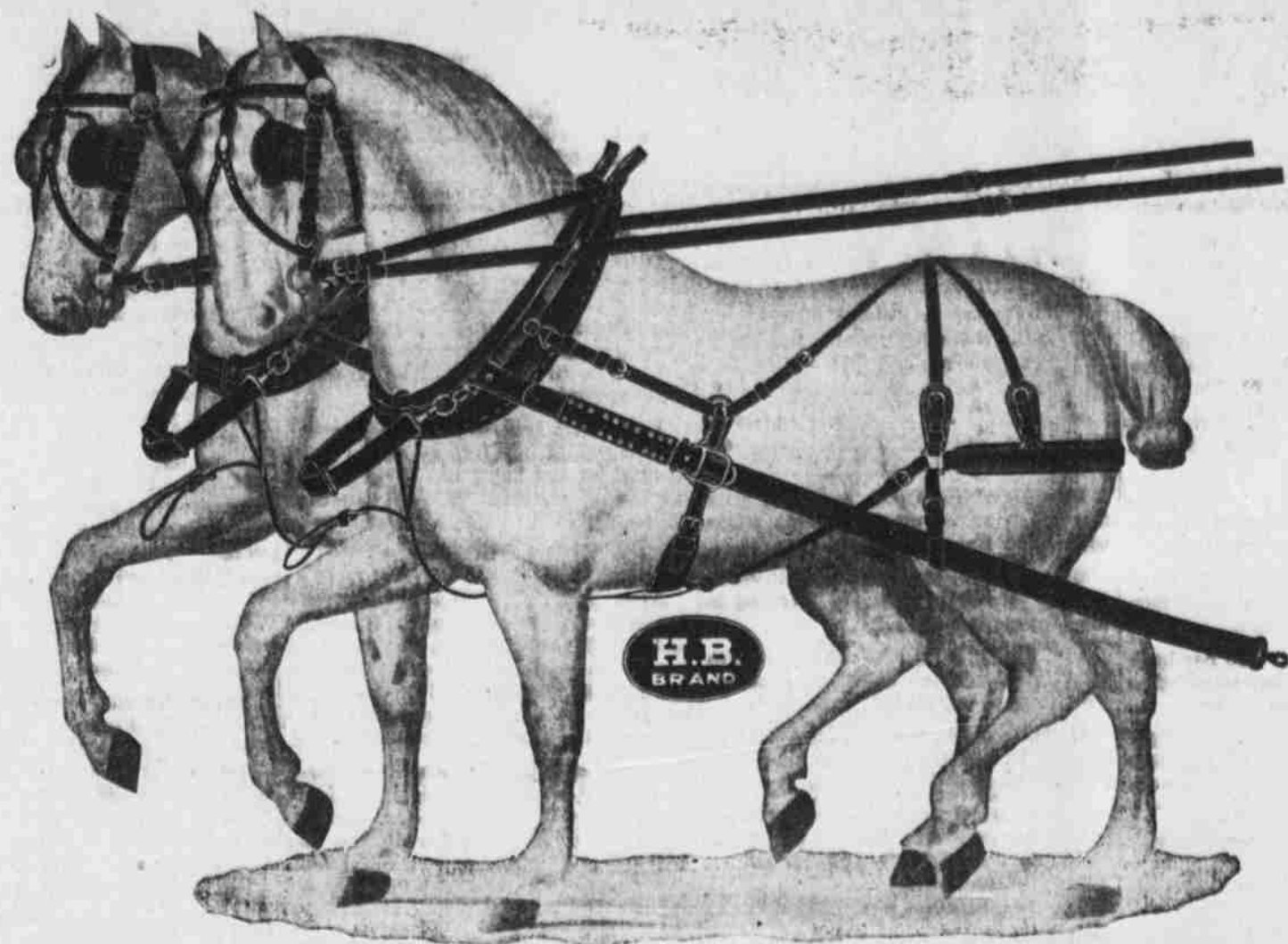

The largest purchase of automobiles ever made in Nebraska was the recent sale of two entire trainloads of Maytag cars to The Freeland Brothers-Ashley Co. of Omaha.

The current is obtained from the magneto which produces enough power to feed the engine and also light a couple of headlights. The outfit includes two reflectors with sliding socket, two Mazda lamps, switch, wire with terminals and clamps. The outfit sells for ten dollars.
