How ever it has not been discovered that anything of value has been taken. An attempt was made to open the safe, but as the robbers were probably amateurs they did not succeed in gettnig it open.

At the Acheson hardware store they were more successful. They made entry through the tin shop in the basement, going down by the stairway which leads to the public library. They had broken the glass in the door and entered the first floor through the trap door in the rear. In order to get the trap door open they tipped a large heater on boys, as was suggested, as the stove was very heavy and was setting on end of a large iron bar which held


