#### PLOT TO MINE MANILLA HARBOR DISCOVERED

Authorities discover explosives in house of Japanese. Ship of Japs seen in harbor at night.

Omaha, Dec. 29.—Special to the Alliance Herald.—A cablegram to one of the newspapers here states that a Japanese plot to mine Manila harbor for the purposes of blowing up American warships, was discovered.

It is believed that the mines were to be placed in the naval anchorage at the bottom of the harbor, and were to be exploded by wires led to the shore and attached to electric batteries.

An unlighted ship, manned by three Japanese, is said to have been seen moving about the harbor for several nights. It is believed that they were making soundings and looking for locations to plant the mines.

An organized search was made of the Japanese quarter yesterday and a quantity of high explosives found. A Jap spy was arrested on Corregidor Island yesterday and more arrests are expected.
