11 LIVES ARE LOST

Eight Burned to Death and Three More Die in Hospital.

ENGINEER SAYS NOT SIGNALLED

Workmen Had Been Repairing Track and Man in Charge of Train Had No Knowledge of Conditions—Scores of Persons Injured.

Easton, Pa., May 1.—So far as it is possible to ascertain here and at the scene of the accident, eight persons were burned to death, three fatally injured and two others so seriously injured that their lives are despaired of and scores of persons were burned and bruised, some of them dangerously, in the wreck of the teachers' special from Utica, N. Y., to Washington, D. C., on the Belvidere-Delaware division of the Pennsylvania railroad in Martin's Creek, N. J.

The line was reopened for traffic. Bones of eight persons have been taken from the debris and the wrecking crew quit work.

The missing, who are given up as dead are: Miss Bessie Walker, Utica, teacher; Miss Susan Session, Utica; Mrs. Mary Allen, Utica; Miss Sophia Knolt, Utica, teacher; Miss Louise Lindeman, Utica, teacher; Miss Sarah Jones, Utica, teacher; Harry Wilmer, Trenton, baggage-master; James Bicknell, Philadelphia, tourist agent of the Pennsylvania railroad; Miss Eleanor Rutherford, Utica, teacher; Walter Vanoy, Trenton, engineer; Charles Person, conductor, Stroudsburg, Pa.

Miss Augusta Lyte of Utica is in a critical condition in the hospital, suffering from general burns and shock, and George W. Parsons of Lambertville, fireman, is severely burned. Neither is expected to survive.

It is the general belief that the rails spread and caused the train to leave the track and plunge over the embankment. Trackmen have been at work at the point of the disaster and it is said the tracks were jacked up, that no signal was out and that the engineer, believing that he had a clear track, rushed into what proved to be a deathtrap.

LAWRENCE HANAKA KILLS SELF.

Stella, Neb., May 1.—Lawrence Hanaka, twenty-one years of age, committed suicide at his home, two miles east of Shubert. The young man had been at a dance at Shubert the night before. His team ran away, smashing the buggy and he reached home some time in the early morning. After writing a letter to his parents, he took carbolic acid with fatal results.

HABEAS CORPUS FOR TILDEN

Packer and Bankers Attack Right of Senate to Arrest Them.

Chicago, April 29.—Judge Pettit in the superior court granted a writ of habeas corpus for Edward Tilden, George M. Benedict and W. C. Cummings within half an hour after they had been arrested by E. H. Hatfield, assistant sergeant at arms of the Illinois state senate. The men gave bond for their appearance Monday.

Hatfield bore warrants charging the refusal of the three to obey subpoenas duces tecum, calling for their appearance with those books and accounts of the Drovers' Deposit National bank and the Drovers' Trust and Savings bank relating to the accounts of Edward Tilden.

INDICTED MEN GIVE BOND

Officials of Iron Company and Pennsylvania Railroad in Court.

Cleveland, April 29.—B. L. Ireland, second vice president of M. A. Hanna & Co., indicted by the federal grand jury, with Dan H. Hanna, president of the company and D. T. McCabe, fourth vice president of the Pennsylvania Railroad company, on charges of rebating and conspiracy to violate the Elkins law, appeared before Clerk Carleton of the United States district court and gave \$5,000 bond for his appearance in the government's suit.

BANK AT NAPONEE ROBBED

Four Men in Automobile Blow Open Safe and Escape With \$2,000.

Naponee, Neb., April 29.—Four robbers rode into this place in an automobile, blew up the vault of the Naponee State bank and escaped with \$2,000 in cash. Citizens were aroused by the explosion, but the bandits threatened them with revolvers and compelled them to seek shelter.

Boy With 30 Soldiers Fights 400 Rebels

Mexico City, April 28.—Refusing to surrender or leave the train on which he and his command of thirty soldiers were being brought to the capital, a second lieutenant, little more than a boy, engaged in a battle with a force of 400 rebels at Cajones, Guerrero. In the conclusion of the brief encounter the lieutenant and twenty-eight of the soldiers were dead and the remaining two of his men were prisoners. One of the arms of the lieutenant was shot away.

Elopes With Little Girl.

Paton, Ia., May 1.—Officers are now closely trailing Ayla Fletcher, the young farm hand who eloped with the thirteen-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lowe. Added to this charge is also that of selling mortgaged property.
