ALLIANCE JUNIOR NORMAL AND COUNTY INSTITUTE

Special Notice to the People of Alliance who will Help make this Year the Best Ever

The Alliance Junior normal will open June 5th with the following instructors in charge: Principal, Supt. W. R. Pate; Registrar, Della M. Reed; Preceptress, Susie R. Frazier; Supt. C. N. Walton of Wahoo, Prof. J. C. Mitchell of Lincoln; Supt. G. E. Martin of Nebraska City; Principal G. H. Williams of Alliance and Supt. H. M. Garret of Ashland. Indications all point to a very successful session and a large enrollment. We should be pleased to have the people of the city take work in the Junior Normal even tho they may not be teachers. Supt. Martin of Nebraska City will offer courses in English Literature and Picture Study and we believe that people interested in literature and art will find this work fully as interesting and instructive as will the teachers.

Institute will be held the first week of the Junior Normal and in addition to the regular Junior Normal faculty we shall have with us Prof. N. A. Bengston of the University of Nebraska who will present the latest to be had in the teaching of Geography and Nature study. Prof. Bengston is a master in the subject he will teach and no teacher can well afford to miss hearing him. In addition to class work, which will be illustrated by stereopticon views, Prof. Bengston will give us an evening lecture which will also be illustrated.

The people of Alliance should make the lowest price possible to teachers for rooms this summer. Teachers draw no salaries during the summer months and during the school year their salaries are not large and they cannot afford to pay fancy prices for room and board. The Junior Normal dining hall will furnish board at actual cost. Let the people of Alliance welcome the teachers to Alliance by offering their rooms at prices commensurate with the salaries paid teachers.

YEOMEN ADOPTION

The Yeomen met last Friday night in their hall and voted in 42 members, 29 being present for adoption. The work was put on by assistant state manager C. E. Matteson, assisted by district manager C. A. Hamrick. After the ceremony the Reds who were defeated by the Greens entertained at a dainty two course luncheon which was followed by "toasts" and "roasts", conducted by Prof. G. M. Burns, toastmaster. This makes an actual membership of eighty, and it is the purpose to increase this number to one hundred before the work closes.
