ALLIANCE STATE JUNIOR NORMAL

A Good Attendance and Excellent Work being Accomplished

Inspector G. A. Gregory visited the Normal last week in behalf of the State Department of Education. He came to us from Chadron, Nebr., where he had visited the State Normal which opened on the same date as the Junior Normal here. The enrollment at Chadron at that time was about seventy.

The dining hall, under the efficient management of Miss Susie R. Frazier, was opened the Saturday preceding the opening of the Normal, and the service has been very satisfactory to those who board there, which includes practically the entire force of out of town teachers and instructors.

A marked interest is shown in athletics, a tennis club and teams in basket ball and indoor base ball having been organized. The tennis courts have been rolled and scraped until there are none better in the state, while the splendid gymnasium of the High school building affords a fine place for basket ball and indoor base ball.

In the indoor base ball, Mr. Dix proves to be a heavy hitter, while Supt. Pate is the chief roofer.

BECOMES REGULAR PASTOR

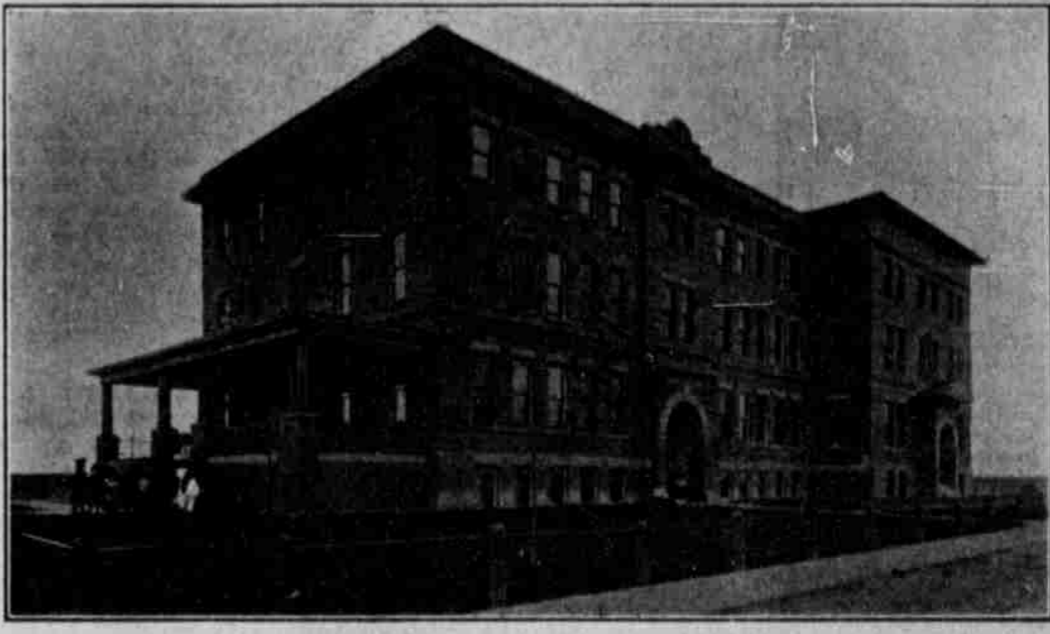
