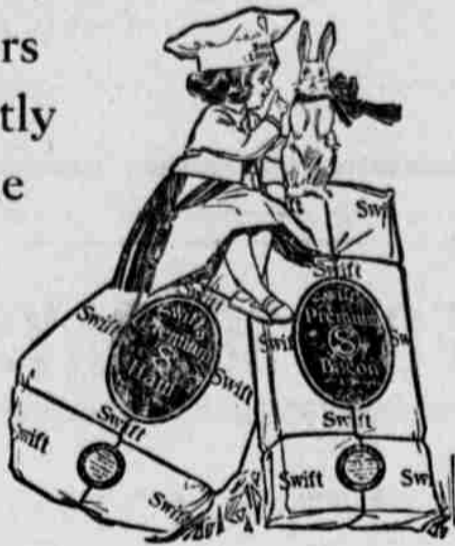

SUGGESTIVE QUESTIONS

On the Sunday School Lesson by Rev. Dr. Linscott for the International Press Bible Question Club.

June 25th, 1911.

Review. Golden Text. What doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God. Micah vi:8.

The following review may be used as a complete lesson in itself, or as a review of the twelve preceding lessons.

The date and title of each lesson, where found, the Golden Text and one question from each lesson follow.

April 2. Elisha Heals Naaman the Syrian. 2 Kings v. Golden Text—Look unto me and be ye saved, all the ends of the earth; for I am God, and there is none else. Isa. xlv:22.

(1.) Verse 1—Is sickness as likely to come to a great as to an ordinary man?

April 9. Elisha's Heavenly Defenders. 2 Kings vi:8-23. Golden Text—For he shall give his angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways. Ps. xcl:11.

(2.) Verse 17—What reason is there for the belief that we are surrounded by spiritual intelligences? (This is one of the questions that may be answered in writing by members of the club.)

April 16. Joash, the Boy King, Crowned in Judah. 2 Kings xi:1-20. Golden Text—Blessed are they that keep his testimonies and that seek him with the whole heart. Ps. cxix:2.

(3.) Verses 1-3—If a child whose heredity and environment were vile, turns out to be a bad man how much should he be blamed?

April 23. Joash Repairs the Temple. 2 Kings xi:21-xii:16. Golden Text—Then the people rejoiced for that they offered willingly. 1 Chron. xxix:9.

(4.) Verse 21—To what extent may we trust the reasoning and deductions of a bright boy, seven years of age, upon matters with which he is familiar?

April 30. God's Pity for the Heathen. Jonah iii:1-iv:11. Golden Text—Go ye therefore and teach all nations. Matt. xxviii:19.

(5.) Verse 5—What effect does repentance, fasting, and prayer, have in these days in preventing the legitimate and natural consequences of sin?

May 7. Uzziah, King of Judah, Humbled. 2 Chron. xxvi. Golden Text—Pride goeth before destruction and an haughty spirit before a fall. Prov. xvi:18.

(6.) Verse 16—What proportion of men are drawn nearer to God, and what proportion are driven to the devil, by earthly prosperity?

May 14. Isaiah's Vision and Call to Service. Isa. vi. Golden Text—I heard the voice of the Lord saying, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said I, Here am I, send me. Isa. vi:8.

(7.) Verse 1—Did Isaiah or anybody else ever see with the outward eyes the actual eternal God, and will he ever be so seen?

May 21. Song of the Vineyard. (A Temperance Lesson.) Isa. v:1-12. Golden Text—Woe unto them that are mighty to drink wine, and men of strength to mingle strong drink. Isa. v:23.

(8.) Verse 11—Name some of our outstanding national sins, and state which you regard as the greatest of them, and why?

May 28. Micah's Picture of Universal Peace. (An International Peace Lesson.) Micah iv:1-3. Golden Text—Nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more. Micah iv:3.

(9.) To what extent is the Christian church responsible for the present insane preparation for war?

June 4. Israel's Penitence and God's Pardon. Hosea xiv. Golden Text—Thou art a God ready to pardon, gracious and merciful, slow to anger. Neh. ix:17.

(10.) Verse 1—What proportion of the members of the present day evangelical churches are walking in the conscious favor of God?

June 11. Hezekiah's Great Passover. 2 Chron. xxx. Golden Text. Man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh on the heart. 1 Sam. xvi:7.

(11.) Verse 1—What was the passover and what its origin?

June 18. The Downfall of Samaria. 2 Kings xvii:1-18. Golden Text—He, that being often reproved hardeneth his neck, shall suddenly be destroyed and that without remedy. Prov. xxix:1.

(12.) Verse 7—What was the real first cause of the blotting out of the kingdom of the ten tribes? (v:20.) Lesson for Sunday, July 2nd, 1911. Isaiah's Prophecy Concerning Senacherib. Isa. xxxvii:14-38.

CONDENSED NEWS

Rev. Joshua Berkeley, well known as a temperance lecturer, was drowned in Crystal lake, Illinois.

A Cincinnati jury acquitted E. S. Cooke of Chicago of embezzling \$24,000 from the Big Four.

Three aviators have met death in the race from London and return, M. Landron, Captain Princetau and M. Le Martin.

Judge William B. Dickson of Cincinnati quashed the revived indictments against George B. Cox, charging him with perjury.

Colonel Charles W. Larned, aged sixty-one, dean of the United States military academy, died in the Danville sanitarium.

President Taft is asked to intercede for the Baptists in Russia in a resolution adopted by the Northern Baptists' convention.

A more drastic anti-corner rule than ever has been in force was adopted by the Chicago board of trade by a vote of 348 to 191.

North New Jersey is overrun with rattlesnakes and they have become such a nuisance that snake clubs have been formed to fight the pests.

Miss Florence Sutton of Los Angeles defeated Eleanor Sears of Boston in the final round for the women's national lawn tennis championship.

Fire at St. Louis destroyed the seven-story building occupied by the Jack Daniel Distilling company and an adjoining lumber yard. Loss, \$100,000.

President Taft will make an effort to visit Omaha Sept. 12-14 for the purpose of attending the annual convention of the first class postmasters of the country.

The shipping trade has developed largely into a squabble over wages and outside of a few mail steamers, owners generally are not suffering appreciable inconvenience.

A general strike of firemen, coal passers, sailors, cooks and stewards started on five steamers of the Morgan line between New York and New Orleans and New York and Galveston.

The American yachts made a clean sweep in the first of the international yacht races for sonder boats at Kiel, the Beaver, Cima and the Biblot, all Americans, finishing in the order named.

The famous battle of 1812 between the United States troops and Miami Indians will be reproduced at Wabash, Ind., next year. The battle was the last engagement with the redskins in Indiana.

General C. A. Rhys Pryce, former commander of the "Army of Liberation" in Lower California, was arrested by United States marshals on a warrant charging violation of the neutrality laws.

Investigation was begun at Chicago by a committee representing the National Association of Railway Commissioners toward regulating express companies and curbing the accumulation of profits.

Use of the shop of the Washington navy yard by officers for the repairing of their automobiles and motor boats is being investigated by the house committee on expenditures in the navy department.

President Taft will be unable to visit Huron, S. D., during his western trip. The president's engagements in the south at the time at which he was wanted at Huron, will prevent his making the visit.

A bill amending the Sherman anti-trust law so as to exclude from its effect all labor organizations, agricultural associations and fraternal societies was reintroduced by Representative Martin of Colorado.

Estimates of the bids for the government's 3 per cent \$50,000,000 Panama loan indicate that the loan has been three times over-subscribed and that the average price of the new bonds will run a little over 102.50.

It is announced that the iron and steel manufacturers of the world will meet in Brussels next January, in an international congress, to discuss a world-wide agreement for making stable the market of their products.

Bemoaning the fate that it is impossible for him to visit Cleveland without attracting newspaper men to the railway station, John D. Rockefeller arrived there for his summer stay at Forest Hill, his estate in East Cleveland.

Because Mrs. Carmelia Degruccia, twenty years old, refused to elope with him, John Omega walked into a restaurant in New York, where she was employed, pushed aside the infant she held at her breast and shot her through the heart and fled.

Efficient administration of modern transportation is all that is necessary to make possible 1-cent postage at once, according to the testimony of James L. Cowles, secretary of the Postal Progress league, who appeared before the committee on postoffices.

George Grostuck, Ecuadorean consul at Berlin, who sold the dismantled Italian cruiser Umbria to the Haitian government, stated that the whole story that Cipriano Castro, the exiled president of Venezuela, was aboard the craft which is now known as the Consul Grostuck, was a myth.

Frauds amounting to several million dollars in duties on importations of cutlery during the last few years have been discovered by secret agents of the customs service who have been working in this country and in the Solingen district of Germany, whence most of the imports come to the United States.

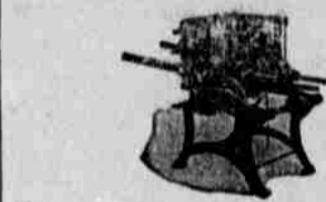
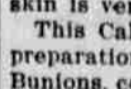

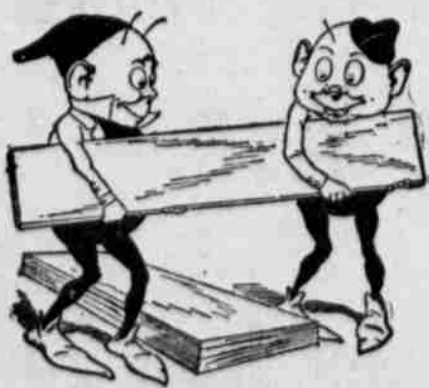
