#### NORTHWEST NEBRASKA COMPARES FAVORABLY

For more than a year past northmuch rain as has been needed. al though we have been having good rains lately. Last year some crops were good, others were poor. This year rye and some other small grain has been injured by dry weather; but the late small grain, corn and potatoes are doing fine, and pasture is good.

Many other sections, even in lower altitudes, have suffered worse from drought this year than this country. A heavy rain in New York within the last few weeks broke the drought. In some portions of eastern Nebraska and Kansas, considered reliable as agricultural districts, small grain was badly damaged by lack of rain early in the season. One of The Herald's Illinois exchanges, the Abingdon Kodak, published in the richest portion of that great farming state, says in its issue of June 13th, "The practical failure of the oats and wheat crop will make a big hole in local business this summer. The elevators will be practically idle and the threshers will have but a short job."

The drought in Missouri has be come so severe that Governor Hadley has been requested to appoint a day for prayer for rain.
