#### DISCOURTESY TO MRS. TAFT

Speaker Against Reciprocity Causes Uproar in Canada.

Winnipeg, Man., June 26.—A parallel drawn between Finance Minister Fielding and President Taft on the one hand and Samson and Deillah on the other, by J. G. M. Bergeron of Quebec, who is accompanying R. L. Borden, leader of the Conservative party, in a whirlwind tour of the west against reciprocity, has caused an uproar among the settlers from the United States.

Bergeron, who may become a minister if Borden retains power in the Dominion, in making his comparison, alleged that Mr. Fielding had succumbed to the blandishments and wiles of "Mrs. Taft," who had blinked at him from the White House.

At Medicine Hat, Alberta, Mr. Bergeron denied that he had been discourteous to "Mrs. Taft," or any other ladies. He admitted that he had spoken of Fielding and the president in comparison with Samson and Deillah.

#### FIVE STEWARDS ARRESTED

Members of Crew of Transport Are Charged With Stealing Stores.

New York, June 26.—A wireless message received here from the transport Kilpatrick, en route from Galveston to this port, gave the information that the vessel had been looted of government property by members of the crew. This was followed by another message, stating that five stewards were put under arrest and placed in the boat's brig.

Upon this information Assistant United States Attorney Gruber obtained warrants for the arrest of the suspects and on the arrival of the Kilpatrick the stewards were taken into custody.

#### Crusade to Protect Uniform.

Albany, N. Y., June 26.—The signing by Governor Dix of a bill making it a misdemeanor for an innkeeper, common carrier or theatrical manager to discriminate against the United States army or naval uniform is the first step in a nation-wide crusade to protect the dignity of the uniform.

#### Widow Gets Big Estate.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 26.—The seven-year-old widow of unknown parents gets the bulk of the big estate left by William C. Hess, a retired farmer of Charter Oak, Ia., according to a decision of the court settling the contest brought by Hess' son.
