NEBRASKA NEWS

President Speaks at Auditorium on World Peace.

RECEPTION IS NONPARTISAN.

Introduced by W. J. Bryan at Luncheon in Capital City—Executive Continues Trip Through State of Nebraska.

Lincoln, Oct. 3.—William Howard Taft was the guest of the capital city and thousands of Nebraskans flocked here to pay him honor in the warm non-partisan reception which was accorded him. Though the sky was cloudy the weather man was kind and did not cause rain to fall upon the crowds who poured upon the streets to witness the parade which took the presidential party from the depot to the hotel and after luncheon to the auditorium.

At the Lincoln hotel luncheon the president was introduced by William Jennings Bryan, who said, as he proposed a health:

"Lincoln is honored by the presence of the highest official of the world. The president's position is greater than a king's. His authority is more vast than any civilized people would trust to a hereditary ruler, and he holds the place not by accident or birth, but by the suffrages of his countrymen. Though in campaigns he is the leader of a party, he is after election the chief executive of a nation, and his arm wields the strength of 90,000,000 of people. Lifted by voters to this position of supreme command, he becomes the most exalted of our public servants. It is fitting that we, a group of sovereigns whom he serves, should pay our respects to him and to the office which he holds. I ask you to rise, fill your glasses with the beverage upon which the Almighty has set his seal of approval, and drink to the health of President Taft, and may God give him wisdom to discharge aright the enormous duties imposed upon him."

Twelve places were reserved at the presidential table. The president sat near the center. On his left was former Senator E. J. Burkett, who acted as host. To his right sat W. J. Bryan. On Mr. Burkett's left was Governor Aldrich and next to him were Senator Norris Brown, C. W. Bryan, Major A. W. Butt and F. M. Hall. To the right of W. J. Bryan sat Mayor Armstrong and next to him were Postmaster E. R. Sizer, Secretary Hiles and Judge A. W. Field.

At the auditorium, into which fully 5,000 people were crowded, Governor Aldrich introduced President Taft, who spoke on the subject of "World Peace."

ELLIOTT IS NOMINATED

Named by Republicans of Third District for Congress.

Fremont, Neb., Oct. 3.—Colonel James Elliott of West Point was nominated by the Republicans for congressman from the Third district at the convention held at Wall's theater.

The first ballot was informal and resulted: Elliott, 94; Young, 48; John Martin of Central City, 26, and Coupland of Madison, 12.

On the second ballot, when Nance was reached on the roll call, all counties having voted solidly for Elliott, further calling of the roll was dispensed with and the West Point man was declared the unanimous nominee of the convention.

Mr. Elliott, in a three-minute speech, declared himself in favor of genuine tariff revision and in full accord with the president and the administration. He declared himself opposed to the interests and combines.

The report of the committee on resolutions submitted by the chairman, Ross L. Hammond, was adopted with out debate. It fully indorsed the administration of President Taft, his stand on the tariff and the records of the departments.

A resolution of tribute to the services of General Manderson to the nation and the party was also adopted.

RECORD CATTLE RECEIPTS

Total of 874 Cars Arrive at South Omaha Stock Yards.

Omaha, Oct. 3.—South Omaha broke two more records when the total number of cars of live stock received was larger than ever before.

The total number of cars was 874, against 844 a week ago, which was the record up to that time.

Cattle to the number of 16,553 arrived at the Union Stock yards, as compared with 16,466 a week ago, which then established a record.

While the record was not broken in the matter of the number of sheep received there were 58,955.

Eight-inch Rain at Stella.

Stella, Neb., Oct. 3.—The rainfall here was about eight inches. The engine room of the electric light plant held so much water that it filled the big trough that the large flywheel turns in, thus putting the lights out of commission and leaving the town in darkness.

Interurban Service to Papillion.

Omaha, Oct. 3.—The Ralston Interurban electric line, which was installed a few years ago from South Omaha to Ralston, has been continued as far as Papillion.

W. C. T. U. DEPARTMENT

Speaker Champ Clark has said: "Let a young man keep away from the saloons if he is ambitious to live a clean, successful life. If he wishes to excel in crime, rob his mental and physical powers, consort with thugs, black-legs, prostitutes and thieves, be a disgrace to his family and a stench to his own nostrils, why I'd advise him to frequent the saloons. He can learn and be any of these things in any liquor saloon. In fact, he can take his post-graduate course without leaving its premises. The saloon is bad, mainly for what it sells, but it is also bad because liquor selling always somehow creates in the premises where it is sold a most unhealthy atmosphere."

At the state W. C. T. U. convention, held in McCook, Sept. 26-29, Miss Mable Young of Alliance was elected one of the nine delegates from Nebraska to attend the national W. C. T. U. convention at Milwaukee the latter part of October. The state officers, editor of the state W. C. T. U. paper, and state secretaries of the Young People's Branch and the Loyal Temperance Legion are members of the national convention by virtue of their offices.

The United States Steel Corporation has prohibited the use of tobacco during working hours in its Pittsburgh mills, claiming that, "It is injurious to the health of the working man."

The W. C. T. U. and other temperance forces of Fort Wayne, Indiana, became convinced that liquor was being sold illegally at the State Fair at Fort Wayne. The husband of the president of the Union applied for a search warrant, and, armed with this, the sheriff raided the place under suspicion, loaded up the stock of wet goods upon trucks and hauled it away.

California is to vote on the suffrage question Oct. 10. One of their mottoes much in evidence is, "We could not possibly make things worse,—give us a square deal and we may help to make them better."

At a recent meeting held in Los Angeles, Judge Cyrus McNutt declared that, "Every crook in California is against woman's suffrage. I do not mean only those crooks who are in jail either. The keeper of every evil den and gambling house in the country will vote against the enfranchisement of women."

Declaration of Principles of the W. C. T. U.

"We believe in the coming of His Kingdom whose service is perfect freedom, because His laws, written in our members as well as in nature and in grace, are perfect, converting the soul.

"We believe in the gospel of the Golden Rule, and that each man's habits of life should be an example safe and beneficial for every other man to follow.

"We believe that God created both man and woman in His own image, and therefore we believe in one standard of purity for both men and women, and in the equal right of all to hold opinions and to express the same right with equal freedom.

"We believe in a living wage; in an eight-hour day; in courts of arbitration and conciliation; in justice as opposed to greed of gain; in 'peace on earth and good-will to men.'

"We therefore formulate, and for ourselves adopt the following pledge, asking our sisters and brothers of a common danger and a common hope, to make common cause with us, in working its reasonable and helpful precepts into the practice of everyday life:

"I hereby solemnly promise, God helping me, to abstain from all distilled, fermented and malt liquors, including wine, beer and cider and to employ all proper means to discount the use of and traffic in the same."

"To conform and enforce the rationals of this pledge, we declare our purpose to educate the young; to reform so far as possible by religious ethical and scientific means,
