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NEBRASKA NEWS

Thirty-fifth Suffragist Convention Begins in Capital City.

WESTOVER TO CALL INQUIRY.

Grand Jury Will Inquire Fully Into Sellers Case—Union Pacific May Delay Putting in Rates—Governor Urges That New Mains Be Installed.

Lincoln, Nov. 21.—The thirty-fifth annual convention of the Nebraska Suffrage association began its sessions here by holding an executive session at the home of Dr. Inez Philbrick, president of the organization. Thirty-five members attended the meeting.

The two days' session of the organization began in All Souls' church. The convention will close Thursday afternoon with the annual election of officers. Members of the association will attend the Mrs. Pankhurst meeting at the city auditorium tomorrow evening.

Roads May Delay Putting in Rates.

The state railway commission granted the Union Pacific railroad permission to delay putting in effect certain class and commodity rates from Lincoln, Fremont, Omaha and Grand Island to the North Platte country until Dec. 1. The rates were to have been made effective Nov. 17. The railroad has not completed its track up the valley at the expected time and the rates are accordingly impracticable. Proportional rates on sugar beets to Scottsbluff are included in the order for delay.

Westover to Call Inquiry.

A special grand jury will be called by Judge Westover in Cherry county to investigate the Sellers murder case, for which four young men are now serving life sentences in the penitentiary. This is the information which has come to Lincoln from Valentine. Popular agitation against the release of Eunice Murphy, who was alleged to have had a part in the plotting of the crime, is the reason for Judge Westover's action.

New Mains Will Be Installed.

At a meeting of the board of public lands and buildings Governor Aldrich urged that all the plumbing at the institution for the feeble minded at Beatrice be replaced in the hope of checking the epidemic of typhoid fever there. The board decided to follow the suggestion and to put in some new water mains. The work of replacing the plumbing may cost the state about \$5,000.

STEWART FOUND NOT GUILTY

Accused Beatrice Institute Official Given Clearance.

Beatrice, Neb., Nov. 21.—After being out thirty-eight minutes the jury in the case of Thomas E. Stewart, charged with the embezzlement of the funds of the state amounting to \$1,337.50, while bookkeeper at the feeble minded institute, returned a verdict of not guilty.

Stewart was bookkeeper during the administration of Dr. G. L. Roe, an appointee of Governor Shallenberger. When Dr. W. M. Thomas was assigned charge of the institute as superintendent Stewart was reappointed by Governor Aldrich. He had served but a few months when trouble occurred between him and Dr. Thomas and his resignation was asked by the governor, who sent State Accountant Tulleys here to check up his books, which showed that there was a shortage of \$1,337.50. He was instructed to put it back by the state executive or he would be arrested. He said he was innocent of any wrongdoing and refused to heed the warning of the governor, and his arrest followed.

Stewart, on the witness stand, denied every charge brought by the state. Judge Pemberton, soon after the trial began, announced that unless the state could connect Stewart with the removal of the money he would have to instruct the jury to bring in a verdict of acquittal.

Firebug Tries to Burn Pool Hall.

An attempt was made to burn down Roy Drake's pool hall at Ord, Neb. The firebug used an augur to bore a hole through the side of the building, but when he struck the back plaster he transferred his efforts to the rear door of the building. Through the hole he poured some kerosene, lighted it and made his getaway, leaving his tracks in the fresh fallen snow. The fire must have gone out when the oil was consumed and left only a charred door and a room full of smoke. In an adjoining frame building, the sample room of Hotel Ord, Mrs. C. H. Partridge and her little daughter are quarantined for scarlet fever.

Error Found in Statutes.

Dawson and Kimball counties are without jurisdiction, as far as the judicial districts of the state are concerned, in Cobbe's 1911 statutes. Both are in the Thirteenth district, according to the apportionment bill passed at the last session of the state legislature.

Silk Thieves Caught.

Three strangers trying to sell silks and furs in Fairmont were arrested by Sheriff Ashton on suspicion. W. H. Taylor of Exeter, Neb., identified some of the goods as having been taken from his store and filed complaint with the county judge.
