**BURLINGTON BUSINESS**  
 Annual Report for Nebraska of the C. B. & Q. R.R. Makes Good Showing for 1911.

**ALLIANCE TAKES FRONT RANK**  
 The annual report of the C. B. & Q. railroad for 1911, which has been recently filed for Nebraska, makes a good showing altho business was somewhat lighter at many points than it was the preceding year.  
 Four leading cities show a gain in total business in 1911 over that of 1910, as follows: Omaha, South Omaha, Lincoln and Scottsbluff. While Alliance shows a decrease in business, it remains near the head of the list in the volume of business transacted, standing third in the amount of money received for tickets, only two cities in the state being ahead of it, Omaha and Lincoln.  
 In total business, including passenger and freight traffic, it stands fifth in the list, Omaha, South Omaha, Lincoln and Grand Island being ahead of it, altho Grand Island leads Alliance by only a small amount.
