CONDENSED NEWS

The house passed the free sugar bill.

The house passed the senate joint resolution prohibiting shipment of arms to Mexico.

The wreck of the battleship Maine was sunk in the open sea three miles off Havana harbor with naval rites.

The house committee on interstate commerce decided to report favorably Sims' bill to abolish the commerce court.

After having resisted death almost a year with a broken back, George H. Lone, forty years old, a miner, died at Lead, S. D.

A dispute over a lot of one dollar led to the slaying of Paul Palowski by Joseph Kollmago in a Chicago boarding house.

Sentries at the fortifications at Muelheim an Rhein, Germany, shot and killed two men attempting to break into one of the forts.

Grain dealers advocated before the senate interstate commerce committee legislation making railroads liable on bills of lading.

Herr Wittee, who took a prominent part in the Berlin aviation meeting at Johannisthal, was killed when his biplane collapsed and fell.

Fifteen thousand dollars in currency was taken from the registered mail pouch on the Arizona and New Mexico railroad at Clifton, Ariz.

The Minnesota Daily, a publication of the University of Minnesota, has joined with Illinois and Iowa papers in their attack on the Big Eight conference.

Representative Sabath introduced in the house another workman's compensation bill and attacked the bill recommended by the employers' liability commission.

American Consul Miller at Tampico, Mex., informed the state department that he had received an anonymous letter warning all Americans to leave that vicinity.

The senate finance committee, by 8 to 6, ordered an adverse report on the house steel tariff revision bill. Democrats will present the house bill in a minority report.

Receivers were appointed for the McCrum Howell company, known as the "Vacuum Cleaner trust," in the United States district court at New York by Judge Sanborn.

Chairman Underwood of the house ways and means committee presented a majority report favoring proposed excise tax bill. Representative Longworth presented a minority report, opposing it.
