### METCALFE IN ALLIANCE

### FIGHT FOR DELEGATES IN HOOSIER STATE

District Conventions Divide Between Taft and Roosevelt.

Indianapolis, March 29.—The Ninth district convention at Lebanon elected William Dye and William Endicott delegates, instructed for Roosevelt.  
Taft supporters in the Second district convention at Vincennes, elected their slate of delegates, Dr. Perry Wooden and David Scott, but they were not instructed.

Two Roosevelt men, Enos Porter and Thomas J. Bryson, were named delegates to the national convention at the Sixth district convention at Connersville.

Harold Hobbs and E. C. Toner were elected at the Eighth district convention at Winchester and instructed for Roosevelt.

Tenth district delegates to the Republican national convention: W. R. Wood and Percy A. Perry, instructed for Taft.

### Railroads Economizing.

Stout City, Ia., March 29.—Western railroads are already preparing to cope with a great coal strike. This was assumed as the reason for the announcement of three local passenger trains, one each on the Northwestern, the Illinois Central and the Rock Island.

### Kills Captain and Commits Suicide.

Ostrode, Prussia, March 29.—Alleging in a letter found in his pocket that he had been driven to desperation by the severity of the discipline, Private Ehrenleben shot and killed his company commander, Captain Reetech, and then committed suicide.

### CITY CONTINUES WET

License Wins Again by Smaller Majority than that of a Year Ago

### W. O. BARNES ELECTED MAYOR

From Wednesday's Daily:

Everybody in Alliance is feeling as well today as could be expected under the circumstances,—in fact, much better than they usually do following a hotly contested city election. With the intense interest there was in the license issue, if its decision had depended upon the candidates to be elected it would have been followed by bitter feelings that would have taken months or perhaps years to eradicate. As it is, there is no ill feeling anywhere today. This is very gratifying to us, as we have so long favored settling the local option question, as well as other questions of public interest, by a direct vote.

The city went wet again as had been forecasted in these columns, but by a reduced majority. The license question was not decided by direct vote last year, two sets of candidates being nominated, one favoring and the other opposing the license. The license candidates last year won by a majority of about one hundred more than this year's majority for license.

At yesterday's election 688 votes were cast. Of these 399, or 55 more than half, voted for license, 258 voted against license, and 31 did not vote on the license question. Following is the vote on the candidates for city offices:
