Alliance Local Union No. 679 Starts Out With a Membership of Fourteen

SCOTTSBLUFF BARBERS UNITE

The barbers of Alliance have taken advance steps by organizing Alliance Local Union No. 679 of the Journeymen Barbers' International Union of America, with the following officers: J. L. Winters, pres.; C. W. Nation, sec'y.; J. E. Moore, treas. The union starts out with a membership of fourteen, including the Scottsbluff barbers who wished to come into the Alliance union. All six of the Alliance shops come into the union, the rules of which require uniform prices and uniform hours. In the opinion of The Herald this is a fine thing for customers as well as barbers, as all may know what hours all shops will be opened and the prices charged for work.

As will be seen by a notice elsewhere in this paper, shop hours are as follows: October 1 to April 1, 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.; April 1 to October 1, 7 a. m. to 7 p. m. On Saturday open till 10 p. m.

Following are the prices for work: hair cut, 35 cents; shave, 15; olive oil shampoo, 50; Pitch shampoo, 50; plain shampoo, 35; egg shampoo, 50; tar shampoo, 35; single, 35; massage, 35; electric massage and hand, 50; beard trimming, 25; removing moles, each, 50; mustache trimming, 10; head massage, 35; razor honing, 50; tonic, 15.

SLAYERS KNOWN

Lines Tightening Around Murderers of Rosenthal.

BECKER'S FRIEND IS NAMED.

Jack Rose Claims That He Can Prove Alibi—Prosecutor Says He is Man Who Hired Auto and Gun Fighters Assassins Took Their Time.

New York, July 22.—"Bald Jack Rose," who hired the motor car which carried the murderers of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, to the scene of the crime, was connected more directly with the case by implication of Deputy Police Commissioner Dougherty. Rose claims he can prove an alibi for the time one hour before and an hour after the killing.

The commissioner was asked whether Police Lieutenant Becker, the friend of Rose and the man whom Rosenthal had declared was in silent partnership with him, has been connected with the case.

"Lieutenant Becker is a figure in this case, but there is nothing tangible against Becker," he said.

While the police were busy with their end of the case, the district attorney's office, with the force of private detectives which has been employed, was working along independent lines. Those who are working with Mr. Whitman felt that the lines are tightening about the slayers of Rosenthal.

Every Move in Crime Known.

Every move in the crime is known to the district attorney's office, it is asserted. The name and description of every man who rode in the "murder car" is known. The name of the man who is said to have called Rosenthal from the Metropole cafe to the street where the murderers were waiting to shoot him, is known, as well as his movements after his death message was given.

Rose is a close friend of Police Lieutenant Becker, who was removed as the head of the "strong arm" squad, which handles the gambling

situation in the city. District Attorney Whitman has gleaned enough information to convince him that Rose, at the suggestion or knowledge of the police, hired some of Jack Zelig's gang of gun fighters to make away with Rosenthal. The market rate for killing men by some of the east side gunmen is said to be \$2,000.

From William Shapiro, driver of the "murder car," District Attorney Whitman and private detectives employed by him have learned that after the shooting the murderers loafed around the scene of the crime with no apparent fear of arrest. Shapiro has told enough details to cause the public prosecutor to believe that the private detectives will soon round up the gang of gun fighters whom the police have daily promised to arrest, but have failed so to do. That the gambling plot and murder plot will lead far deeper into the police department is now generally believed.

STEEL TRUST REPORT

House Republicans Are Working on Measure.

Washington, July 22.—The Republican members of the Stanley steel trust investigating committee worked on a report of their views of the results of the steel inquiry, and when it is submitted to the house it will create more of a sensation than that prepared by Chairman Stanley. This assertion was made by a member of the committee. He said the Republican recommendations would be more far-reaching than those made by the Democrats and that the bills to be suggested to the house would be for constructive legislation to amend the trust laws, rather than censure the officials who failed to curb the growth of the steel trust.

Escaped Convict Recaptured.

Pierre, S. D., July 22.—E. W. Bell, a convicted negro forger who escaped from a train while being taken to the penitentiary at Sioux Falls, was captured near Cops, S. D., by a posse which used a bloodhound to trail him.

IN MURDER CASE.

Police Lieut. Becker And Friend, Jack Rose, Who Is Under Arrest.

IA short time before he was murdered Rosenthal accused Becker of being his partner in the Forty-fifth street gambling house. Becker, he said, received 20 per cent of the winnings. The lieutenant is believed to have advanced the \$1,500 on the chattel mortgage. Rose was said to have been stationed in Rosenthal's place to gather in the receipts for Becker.

SOLONS VISIT WILSON

Speaker of National House Leads Caravan of 116 to Seagirt.

Champ Clark, speaker of the house led his caravan of followers a tortuous way along the dusty roads of Seagirt, N. Y., to Governor Wilson's summer home.

They came 116 strong from the house of representatives in a special train from Washington to shake hands with the nominee and bid him good-speed for the presidency. It was the first time in the history of the United States that Democrats or Republicans in congress had quit their work to dash across the country and hail the party standard bearer.

Governor Wilson met them half way down the walk stretching away from his front porch to the roadway, escorted Mr. Clark to the wide porch and there completed the welcome by grasping every pilgrim by the hand.

FULL TICKET TO GO IN FIELD

Michigan Progressive Republicans Leave Old Party.

Jackson, Mich., July 22.—Michigan progressive Republicans divorced themselves from the Republican party in their state convention.

By almost a unanimous vote the delegates went on record as favoring the placing of an entire ticket, both state and national, in the field.

Delegates to the national progressive party convention in Chicago, presidential electors, members of the state central committee and a member of the national committee were chosen.

Wealthy Man Charged With Murder.

New York, July 22.—George R. Harkness, a wealthy real estate dealer of Sea Cliff, Long Island, was arrested, charged with having shot and killed Mrs. Florence Hopp of Lewisburg, Pa., at the hotel here, where they were guests. Mrs. Hopp, who was about twenty-five years old, had been in Harkness' company for several days.

Colorado to Oust Lumber Trust.

Greeley, Colo., July 22.—Proceedings against the so called lumber trust of the state were brought by District Attorney George A. Carlson of the Eighth judicial district, in a complaint filed in the district court here. The court is asked to restrain the companies from pooling their earnings, agreeing on margin of profit, or fixing prices of lumber.

Mount Vernon, N. Y., July 22.—The latest achievement of a prize winning Plymouth Rock hen, owned by W. F. Boltman of this city, is an egg ten inches in circumference and weighing five and one-half ounces. The hen is a steady layer and all her eggs are oversize, most of them being double yolked.
