Kaiser Wilhelm has a serious cold. Chorus girls say they got champagne in pitchers at the Vanderbilt Newport Oriental ball.

With ten games won and one lost, P. Elliott won the championship of the Western Chess association.

Augustin W. Cromwell, descendant of Oliver Cromwell, celebrated his 100th birthday at Norwood, Pa.

A force of 2,000 Mongolian troops has occupied the city of Taonan, Manchuria, looting houses and stores.

For the first time in seventeen years, West Hammond, a suburb of Chicago, probably will have the "lid" on.

Twenty-four million labels for canned tomatoes must be reprinted to satisfy a ruling of the department of agriculture.

President Taft accepted an invitation to address the National Association of Postoffice Clerks in Faneuil hall, Boston, Sept. 3.

The general revolt of natives against Portuguese rule at Timer, Malay archipelago, has been suppressed after several sanguinary battles.

An enthusiastic good roads convention was in session at Pierre, S. D., resulting in the choice of J. W. Parmley of Ipswich as president.

Walter A. McCreery, clubman and international polo player, who returned to San Francisco from London, bundled up in furs, was adjudged insane.

Carrying 750 marines, the United States cruiser Prairie sailed from the Philadelphia navy yard for Colon, from where the marines will be sent to Nicaragua.

Rochester was chosen as the 1913 meeting place of the National Association of Mercantile Agencies and a Rochester man, William H. Barr, was named president.

Governor Oswald West served notice on the authorities of the city of Portland and Multnomah county that he proposed to institute a moral "house cleaning" in Portland.

The Aero club of America has notified the Million Population club of St. Louis that its balloon is entitled to a place in the international balloon race at Stuttgart, Germany, on Oct. 7.

The Wisconsin railway commission handed down a decision which requires the Milwaukee Electric railway to sell thirteen tickets for 50 cents, with the usual transfer privileges.

The interstate commerce commission suspended from Aug. 26 until Dec. 24 a proposed increase of 15 cents a ton in the transportation charges on coal from Illinois mines to destinations in Iowa.

One woman was seriously injured and two women and a man slightly hurt in Minneapolis when an automobile filled with Kansas City tourists skidded on the pavement and struck the curb.

A shipment of rifles, believed to have been intended for Haiti, was seized by the custom authorities at Kingston, Jamaica, on board the British schooner Bartoldi, which was clearing for a gulf port.

The United States fuel ship Jupiter, the first electrically driven seagoing vessel ever built and the largest ship of any description ever laid down on the Pacific coast, was launched at the Mare Island navy yard.

Brigadier General E. V. Sumner, retired, died at the Presidio hospital, aged seventy-seven. He was born at Carlisle, Pa. General Sumner served throughout the civil war and participated in the Indian wars in the west.

Radical changes in the regulations governing surveys of lands in Alaska, under which fisheries companies and others have acquired rights to thousands of desirable sites without patenting them, were made known in Seattle.

"We are all together again and all happy," is the way Nicholas J. McNamara, the San Mateo (Cal) banker, sums up the result of his chase across the continent and back for his wife, their two small sons and his automobile.
