Unless ample preparations are made considerably in advance of the time for the county fair for exhibits of farm and industrial products and live stock, the races constitute the principal feature. Claude Vaughan, secretary of the fair association, informs The Herald that they never before had a better prospect for a successful race meet than this year. There were plenty of horses in sight. There was a chance to fill on the 2:15, 2:17 and 2:20 classes. On account of the scare over the epidemic among horses in other places it was thot best the first of the week to call off the races, and horsemen were wired accordingly.
