

## HORSE SALE TO BE HELD AS ADVERTISED

The horse sickness at other places naturally made horsemen in this part of Nebraska uneasy for awhile, but with the coming of cool weather, especially since the recent heavy frosts here, danger of the disease is considered to have been entirely eliminated. For the information of Herald readers in other places we will mention that we had three frosts at Alliance last week, two of them quite heavy, and Tuesday night of this week water froze to a thickness of five-eighths of an inch. It is conceded that cold weather will put a stop to the disease where it now prevails, and if this is correct the cold we have already had will certainly do away with any danger there might have been of the disease getting started in this part of the country.

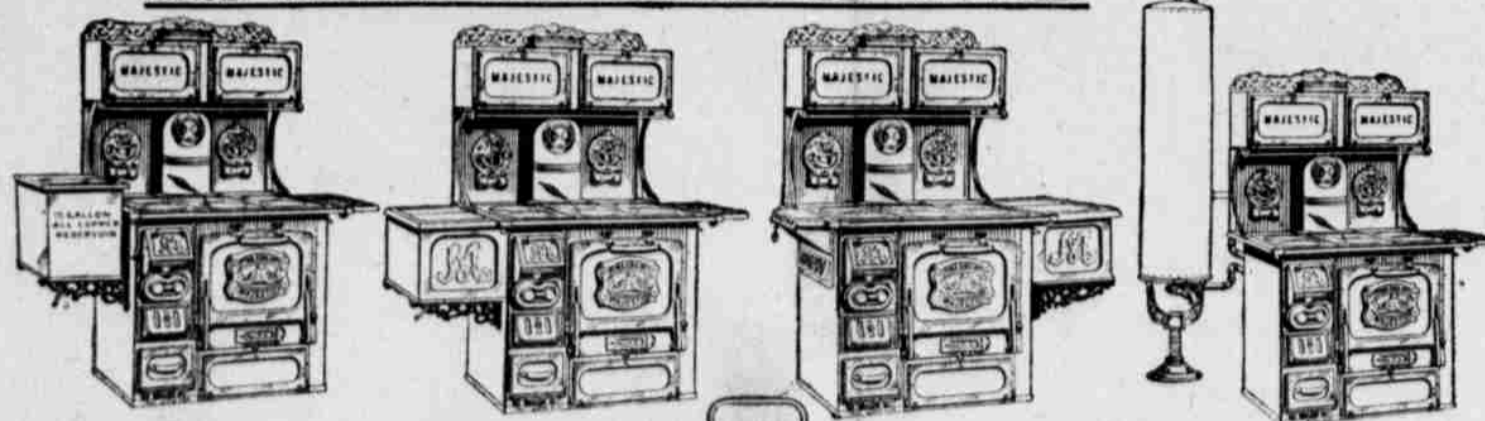
