

4 MARINES KILLED

American Bluejackets Drive Nicaraguan Rebels From Hills.

INSURGENT LEADER IS SLAIN

Federals Seize Chance to Capture Masaya and Break Famine—Number of Marines Wounded—Native Loss Heavy on Part of Both Armies.

In a gallant assault, American marines and bluejackets drove the Nicaraguan revolutionary leader, General Zeledon, and his forces from Coyotepe and Barrancas hills, near Masaya, after thirty-seven minutes of fighting, but in the action four privates of the United States marine corps were killed and a number were wounded.

The victory of the Americans opened the way for the Nicaraguan government troops to assault the town of Masaya, which they took from the revolutionists, and the starving inhabitants were relieved.

The insurgents' losses were heavy, while the government forces lost 100 killed and 200 wounded.

General Zeledon, the rebel leader, escaped, but later was cornered and killed by a troop of federal cavalry.

One thousand American marines and bluejackets, under Lieutenant Colonel Charles G. Long, are moving on the city of Leon, the remaining rebel stronghold.

TRIPLE COLLISION OF AUTOS

Eight Men Lose Lives in Accident on a Bridge in Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Oct. 7.—A collision on a bridge in which three automobiles were involved resulted in the deaths of eight men at Thirty-third and Thompson streets in this city.

One of the machines, containing nine men, came onto the bridge at terrific speed. Its rapid approach was seen by John I. Spade, a Philadelphia contractor, who was going over the bridge in the opposite direction in a motor. He tried to avoid the car, but he was too late in steering out of its way and a collision occurred.

A third automobile was directly behind the speeding car, which ran into it, with the result that the first machines was catapulted over the bridge and down into a coal yard alongside the Pennsylvania railroad tracks.

The drop was about forty feet. The other two cars were damaged, but their occupants were uninjured and immediately went to the rescue of the others.

LEVEE IS WIPED OUT

Denizens of Chicago Vice District Spread Through City.

Chicago, Oct. 7.—Chicago has no south side "levee." The segregated vice district which has been a brightly lighted, crowded quarter in the heart of the city ever since the great fire of '71, was dark and deserted for the first time in forty years.

The "levee" is populated, according to statistics collected by the vice commission, with 4,000 denizens of the underworld, 2,200 of whom were women.

LINER WRECKS SUBMARINE

British Warship Cut in Two by the Steamship Amerika.

The British submarine B2 was run down by the Hamburg-American liner Amerika off Dover. It sank at once, drowning fourteen of the crew. The officer in charge was rescued.

The disaster in which the B-2 was sunk occurred while the third patrol flotilla of submarines, consisting of six vessels, was maneuvering off the south foreland on the coast of Kent. The liner Amerika appears to have cut the submarine in halves.

Lieutenant Richard I. Pulleyne, who was second in command, was the only man among the crew of fifteen who was saved. He was found floating in the sea, too exhausted to say more when he was rescued than, "The submarine is cut in two. I went down a mile."

VIRGINIA DOCTOR RUNS AMUCK

Physician Holds Up Boys, Killing One and Wounding Another.

Chilwood, Va., Oct. 7.—Dr. Samuel L. Steward, a well-known physician of this place, held up a party of boys on the road near here and commanded them to "line up" so he could kill them. One of the boys ran, and Steward shot him in the leg. He then turned the weapon on the other boys and killed one, the others escaping unhurt. Steward was arrested. He is believed to be insane.

MAY AVERT WAR

Turkey Must Give Guaranty of Reforms in Macedonia.

LEAVES NO EXCUSE FOR WAR.

Allies All Accept Suggestion With Exception of Great Britain, Which Will at Once Fall in Line—Slight Change in Proposal.

Paris, Oct. 7.—Austria has given adhesion to the plan formulated by the French and Russian foreign ministers to deal with the Balkan situation. Austria, however, suggested a slight change in the wording of the proposals, which met with the immediate approval of both M. Poincare and M. Sazonoff. The only effect of the amendment is more sharply to define the intentions of the powers and present a more precise statement of these.

It is understood the proposals do not include a demand for the autonomy of Macedonia, but urge the adaptation of the provisions of the treaty of Berlin providing for a larger measure of home rule. It is believed here the proposals will remove any lurking suspicions in England that the continental powers possibly were contemplating a settlement wholly at the expense of Turkey.

Germany and Italy have approved their ally's modifications; so that, with full adhesion of the British government, which is expected today, the powers will be in a position to say to the Balkan coalition that the Balkan states will no longer have to depend on the promises of Turkey, but in the pledged word of Europe.

The French government is confident that all the preliminaries will be completed in time to permit Russia and Austria, as the mandatories of Europe, to present a collective note to Sofia, Belgrade, Athens and Cetinje tomorrow. As soon as this is done, Turkey will be invited to give guaranties which will render effective the promise that Europe will take upon its shoulders responsibility for the realization of the reforms.

In official circles the feeling prevails that this guaranty offered by the powers ought to satisfy the Balkan states, if, as they profess, their sole motive in mobilizing against Turkey was to force the reforms provided for in the treaty of Berlin.

Turks Win Fight on Border.

Constantinople, Oct. 7.—An engagement has taken place at Berana, near the Montenegrin frontier, between Turks and Montenegrins. The Montenegrins were repulsed, according to advice received here. The Turkish government, it is understood, views this affair as practically the beginning of hostilities.

PHONE MAKES PEOPLE CRAZY

German Mental Specialist Testifies to That Effect in Court.

Berlin, Oct. 7.—Dr. Strauch, a mental specialist, has discovered a new disease which he calls telephone nervousness. A prominent Berlin attorney had been in continual conflict with the postoffice for more than a year regarding his telephone. Several times he was prosecuted on the charge of insulting the telephone girl, and finally his telephone connection was cut off.

The attorney began proceedings for its restoration. The postoffice department offered as a defense that the attorney was continually insulting officials.

Dr. Strauch was called as expert and testified that telephone nervousness is a serious ailment. The telephone, he said, acts on certain persons like poison. He continued:

"I know a case in my personal practice of a physician who was so worked up by delays and other unpleasant occurrences that he became permanently insane. Excitable persons should never use the telephone."

INDIAN CONGRESS ELECTS

Dr. Sherman Coolidge of Minnesota Is Chosen President.

Columbus, O., Oct. 7.—Appointment of more Indians to the government service, codification of the laws relating to this race and better school facilities for their children were among the measures embodied in a platform adopted by the delegates to the American Indian congress here.

The delegates voted to petition President Taft to defer the appointment of a successor to E. G. Valentine Indian commissioner, who resigned a month ago, until after the election.

Among officers elected for the coming year were: Rev. Dr. Sherman Coolidge of Fairbault, Minn., president and Thomas I. Sloan of Pender, Neb., first vice president.

Strikers Stop Passenger Trains.

Augusta, Ga., Oct. 7.—Two passenger trains running in opposite directions between here and Atlanta on the Georgia railroad were held up by strike sympathizers and the conductors and flagmen badly beaten. Similar treatment was accorded the strike-breaking train crew of a freight train.

Customs Officers Seize Gould Gems.

New York, Oct. 7.—Thirty-six pieces of burghese which Frank J. Gould, his wife and her three sisters brought to America, when they arrived from France, are being held up by the customs authorities. With their content of gems and jewels the trunks are valued at \$100,000.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. ONE.

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D. 1912.

"An ACT to amend the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D. 1912.

Section 1. That the general election for state and legislative officers to be held on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November, 1912, the following provisions be added to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full:

Section 1. The legislative authority of the state shall be vested in a legislature consisting of a senate and house of representatives, but the people reserve themselves the right to propose and to amend or to reject the same at the polls independent of the legislature, and to approve or to reject at the polls any act, item, section, or part of any act passed by the legislature.

Section 1A. The first power reserved by the people is the initiative. Ten per cent of the legal voters of the state, so distributed as to include five per cent of the legal voters in each of two-fifths of the counties of the state, may propose any measure by petition, which measure shall be filed with the secretary of state and be him submitted to the voters at the first regular state election held not less than four months after such filing. The measure, either in form or in essential substance, shall not be submitted to the people by initiative petition oftener than once in three years. If conflicting measures submitted to the people at the same election shall be approved, the measure which received the affirmative votes shall thereby become law as to all conflicting provisions. The measure shall be subject to referendum by the legislature shall apply to those enacted by the initiative.

Section 1B. The second power reserved by the people is the referendum. It may be ordered by a petition of ten per cent of the legal voters of the state, distributed as provided in section 1A, and may be applied to any act or part thereof which shall be approved by the people. The referendum shall be subject to referendum by the legislature shall apply to those enacted by the initiative.

Section 1D. Nothing in this section shall be construed to deprive any member of the state of the right to introduce any measure. All such measures shall be subject to referendum by a majority of the votes cast thereon, provided, the votes cast in favor of said measure or part of said measure shall constitute thirty-five per cent (35%) of the total vote cast at said election. The referendum shall take effect upon proclamation by the governor, which shall be made within ten days of the completion of the official canvass. The method of submitting and adopting amendments to the constitution provided by this section shall be supplemented by the provisions of article 3 of this constitution, entitled "Amendments," and the latter shall in no wise be affected by this section.

Section 2. That the style of all bills shall be "Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska," and no law shall be enacted except by bill. No bill shall be introduced unless it carries the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each house of the legislature. The original copy of any bill shall be taken immediately upon its passage and the yeas and nays shall be entered upon the journal.

Section 3. That the general election on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November, 1912, on the ballot of each elector voting thereat there shall be printed or written the words "Amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska," and the proposed amendment to the constitution shall be presented to the electors in full, as passed by the Thirty-second session of the Legislature of the State of Nebraska, as appears from said original bill on file in this office, and that said proposed amendment is submitted to the qualified voters of the state of Nebraska for their adoption or rejection at the general election to be held on Tuesday, the 5th day of November, A. D. 1912.

The referendum shall take effect upon proclamation by the governor, which shall be made within ten days of the completion of the official canvass. The method of submitting and adopting amendments to the constitution provided by this section shall be supplemented by the provisions of article 3 of this constitution, entitled "Amendments," and the latter shall in no wise be affected by this section.

Section 2. That the style of all bills shall be "Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska," and no law shall be enacted except by bill. No bill shall be introduced unless it carries the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each house of the legislature. The original copy of any bill shall be taken immediately upon its passage and the yeas and nays shall be entered upon the journal.

Section 3. That the general election on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November, 1912, on the ballot of each elector voting thereat there shall be printed or written the words "Amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska," and the proposed amendment to the constitution shall be presented to the electors in full, as passed by the Thirty-second session of the Legislature of the State of Nebraska, as appears from said original bill on file in this office, and that said proposed amendment is submitted to the qualified voters of the state of Nebraska for their adoption or rejection at the general election to be held on Tuesday, the 5th day of November, A. D. 1912.

Section 4. That at said election on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November, 1912, on the ballot of each elector voting thereat there shall be printed or written the words "Amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska," and the proposed amendment to the constitution shall be presented to the electors in full, as passed by the Thirty-second session of the Legislature of the State of Nebraska, as appears from said original bill on file in this office, and that said proposed amendment is submitted to the qualified voters of the state of Nebraska for their adoption or rejection at the general election to be held on Tuesday, the 5th day of November, A. D. 1912.

Section 5.
