## NEBRASKA NEWS

### Governor Wilson is Given Ovation at Lincoln.

### BRYAN AND CANDIDATE MEET.

Democratic Presidential Nominee Goes to Nebraskan's Home at Fairview. Is Greatly Pleased With His Reception in Capital City.

"Hello, Mr. Bryan; hello, Mr. Bryan." "Welcome, welcome governor."

These words alone and a cordial handshake brought together at Lincoln for the first time since the national campaign opened the presidential nominee of the Democratic party and the man who three times was the standard bearer of the same party.

As the governor stepped from the end of his private car, virtually into the arms of Mr. Bryan, the din of cheers and cries of enthusiasm from thousands of throats practically swelled the way into a waiting auto while during a demonstration that was the beginning of a great reception which Governor Woodrow Wilson will never see nor understand the like of.

With the blowing of whistles, the factories, the ringing of automobile horns and the music of bands, the presidential nominee and the former nominee rode together through a caress of humanity which overflowed the streets of Lincoln for scores of blocks. There were cries of "Bryan and Wilson" and "Wilson and Bryan" for Mr. Bryan himself had just returned from a six weeks' stump tour through the west in behalf of Wilson and Marshall.

Governor Wilson and Mr. Bryan spoke together for the first time at a banquet of the Democratic state committee. Cheers and enthusiasm were continuous, and Governor Wilson thanked Mr. Bryan publicly for the support he gave him at Baltimore, and Bryan in turn appealed to the Democracy "to do for Wilson twice as much as they ever did for Bryan."

### DEGREE OF HONOR ELECTION

Mrs. M. H. Cleaver of Lincoln Agair Chosen Grand Chief.

The Degree of Honor completed its election of officers at Lincoln and the following will be the official roster of the Nebraska jurisdiction for the next biennium:

Grand chief of honor, Mayme Hedrick Cleaver of Lincoln; grand lady of honor, Minnie Shanahan of Lincoln; grand chief of ceremonies, Maggie Steele of South Omaha; grand recorder, Etta Brooks of South Bend; grand treasurer, Katie Schmidt of Omaha; grand usher, Anna Stover of Geneva; grand inner watch, Ann Grassman of Holdrege; grand outer watch, Minnie Lahan of Grand Island.

Headquarters of the order will be in Lincoln for the next biennium.

It was voted to allow members who reach the age of seventy years to withdraw from the order, giving their back the assessments they have paid with interest at 4 per cent.

The next meeting will be held in Fremont the second week in October.

### District Attorney Ayres Files Brief.

District Attorney Ayres has filed a brief in the supreme court in support of the findings of Referee Holcomb in the South Omaha fire and police commission case. He asks for a judgment on the findings, which were that the defendants, John J. Ryan and Joseph Pivonka, had wilfully failed to enforce the liquor laws and should be forced to give up their offices. He combats the assertion of the defendants that they are serving a second term instead of a first term and therefore cannot be ousted for acts committed during their first term.

### Sawyer Goes to Texas.

Ulysses Grant Sawyer, who has been engineer at the state house for several years, has handed in his resignation and will move to Texas. It is understood that his job will not go begging, for already four patriots have filed notice that they think they can sign up a monthly voucher in as acceptable a manner as did Mr. Sawyer.

### Plan to Enlarge Campus.

The business men of Lincoln are considering a new proposition for enlarging the university campus. The plan is for the city to buy four additional blocks next to the present campus if the legislature will appropriate \$100,000 per year for the next four years.

### Judge Rules Against McShane.

Judge Cosgrove of the Lancaster district court sustained the demurrer of the state to the petition of Felix J. McShane, sheriff of Douglas county. By this decision Sheriff McShane will receive but 15 cents per day for boarding prisoners after conviction.

### Stanton Wants Depot.

The Retail Merchants' association of Stanton has petitioned the railway commission to compel the Northwest Railway company to build a new depot at that place, claiming that the present structure is too small and unfit for public use.

### Seven Cases of Spinal Meningitis.

A report has been received by Dr. Wilson of the state medical board that three children have died of spinal meningitis at Lewistown and four from the disease at Bennington.

### TEACHERS FOR PORTO RICO

Young Nebraska Women Assigned Places on Island.

Lincoln, Oct. 7.—A number of teachers, most of them well known in Nebraska, have been assigned to positions in Porto Rico.

Miss Marion Holcomb of Lincoln was assigned to the seventh grade in the school at San Truce and Miss Gertrude Kincaid to the eighth grade in the same school. The Misses June and Lucille Brown of Omaha, daughters of United States Senator Brown, were assigned to Ponce. Miss Grace Salisbury of Lincoln was assigned to the George O. Robinson school for orphan girls in San Truce.

Miss Emma Swezey of Lincoln was assigned to Arbonito. Miss Mary Alice Lynch of Omaha was assigned to Arecibo, but was later transferred to the sixth grade of the training school in the normal department of the university, to fill a vacancy which occurred at the last moment. This makes three Nebraska women in the university—Miss Tibbets, the principal of the training school; Miss Lynch, sixth grade, and Miss Piper, seventh grade.

### NEW CANDIDATE FOR SENATOR

Name of J. H. Ferguson to Go on Ballot by Petition.

Lincoln, Oct. 7.—The campaign for the United States senate was made more interesting by the filing of a certificate with the secretary of state stating that "We, the undersigned, ask that the name of J. H. Ferguson of Broken Bow be placed on the official ballot by petition." The certificate had attached the names of 1,249 men, most of them giving their residence as Omaha.

### SEIDEL PREACHES SOCIALISM

Former Mayor of Milwaukee Expounds His Party's Doctrine.

Omaha, Oct. 7.—Emil Seidel, former mayor of Milwaukee and candidate for vice president on the Socialist ticket, raked the Progressive and the other two parties impartially, charging them with being the tools of the "twelve billion-dollar trust" and the corporations. "No matter which of those parties win," he said, "you will lose and the corporations will win."

### Free Delivery for Wymore.

Wymore, Neb., Oct. 7.—A postoffice inspector was here looking over the city to determine the advisability of installing free city mail delivery, in accordance with a bill recently passed in congress providing for city mail delivery in small towns as an experiment. Wymore is the first town in Nebraska to be considered, as this city is the first to have put in a petition asking for delivery service. It is expected that the service will be established in about thirty days.

### Nemaha County's Apple Crop Large.

Auburn, Neb., Oct. 7.—Much difficulty is being experienced by the apple shippers of Brownville in getting cars. Already over 100 cars have been shipped from this place and it is estimated that over 200 will be sent from there. Peru, Nemaha, Brock and Johnson are also important shipping points. At Howe over 15,000 bushels will be shipped from the orchard of Church Howe & Son.

### Quarantine in Montana.

Governor Norris of Montana has issued a proclamation forbidding Nebraska and Kansas horses to enter the state. He says that "an unknown disease, dangerous, contagious, communicable and fatal," prevails in those states and the proclamation is issued to prevent spread of the disease. Dr. Bostrom, state veterinarian of Nebraska, has received a copy of the proclamation.

### Manuel Files Report.

Superintendent C. B. Manuel of the industrial school for boys at Kearney has filed his report with the board of public lands and buildings and shows a decrease in the membership for the month of September, 185 boys answering to roll call, against 205 the previous month. Thirty-one boys were paroled during the month and eight received.

### Woman 102 Years Old Dies at Seward.

Seward, Neb., Oct. 7.—Mrs. Susanna Parrish, the oldest woman in Nebraska, died at the home of her son, John Parrish. She was born in Ohio Aug. 2, 1810, and has lived in Nebraska since 1880. She was the mother of seven children, only three of whom are living. She leaves twenty-six grandchildren and twenty-seven great-grandchildren.

### Record Price for Land.

Dorchester, Neb., Oct. 7.—George Johnson of this place sold his 160-acre farm, lying two miles north of town, to John Stockley of Millford for \$175 per acre. This is a record price for land in this locality.

### Ex-Mayor Miller of Dorchester Dead.


Dorchester, Neb., Oct. 7.—A telegram was received announcing the death of ex-Mayor Franklin Miller of this place, which occurred in Lordsburg, Cal.

### Dr. Wilson Returns.

Dr. H. H. Wilson of the state board of health returned from Washington, where he attended the international congress of hygiene and demography. Thirty-three different nations were represented by about 2,000 delegates.

### To Prosecute Phone Company.

The state railway commission has ordered a criminal action to be begun against the Lincoln Telephone and Telegraph company for changing rates without permission of the commission.
