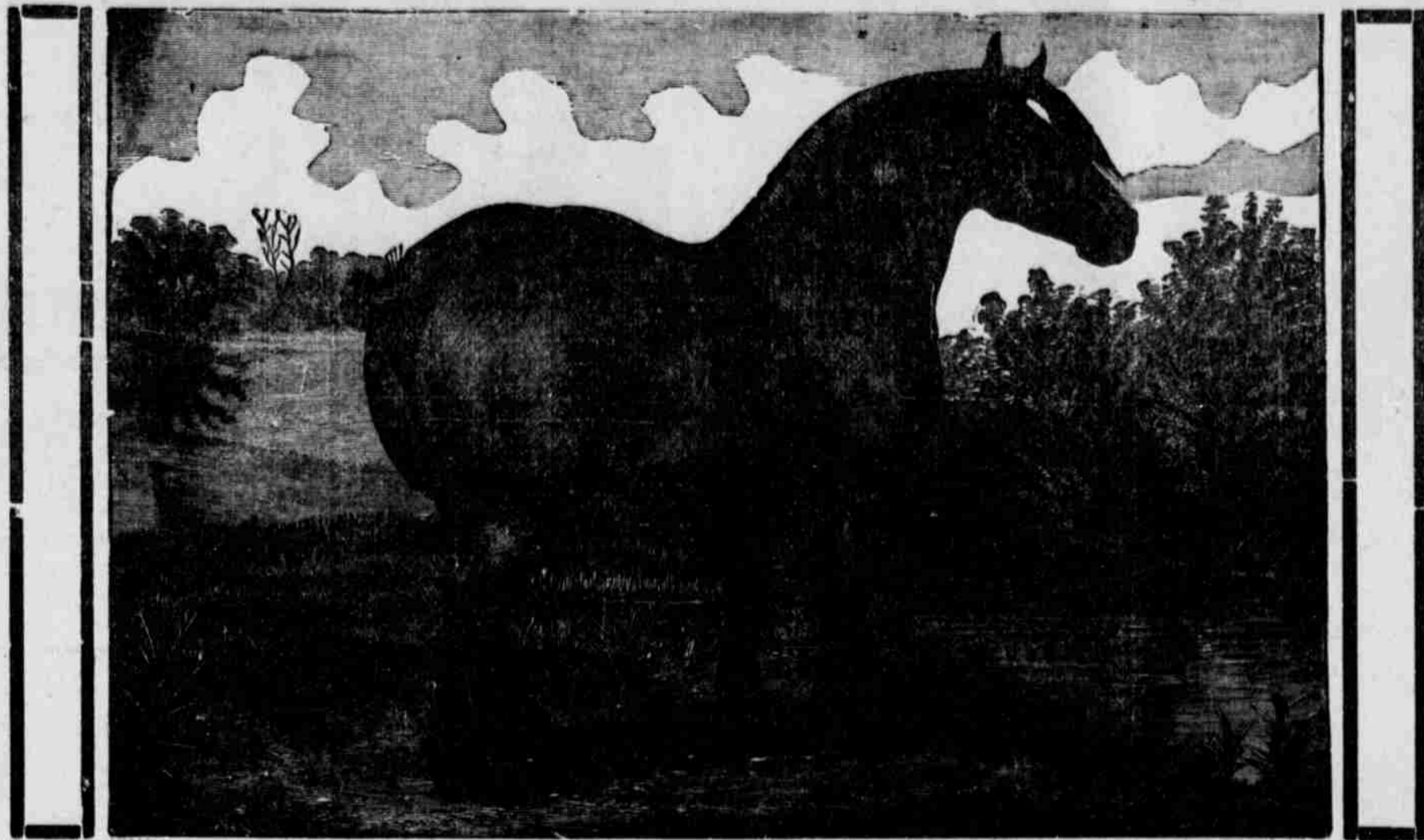

were socialists before them, or that they always voted the socialist ticket and are too old now to make a change. As people generally come to know these things, their prejudice is naturally removed and they become open to conviction.

One more thing we wish to mention in this connection is that while socialism is now commonly understood to mean government, or "social" ownership, it is not yet generally recognized that there are different degrees of socialism, if we may so express it, that is, that there is a difference of opinion among those calling themselves socialist as to the extent of government ownership. Ultra socialists, or extremists, believe in government ownership of everything, literally doing away with private ownership; but it is fair to say that there are but few of that class of socialists in this country now, none so far as we know among the recognized leaders of the party. Conservative socialists, to which class it seems that most of the leaders of the movement in America now belong, believe in "social (government) ownership of the means of production", including means of public transportation, etc. There are many persons who do not call themselves socialist who believe in "government ownership of public utilities", so that there is not much difference after all between radical "progressives" in the other parties and the conservative socialists. When these radical progressives in the republican and democratic parties lose hope of securing through the old parties the reforms that they want, or the things which they believe to be reforms, they turn to a new party that advocates them, or something similar. This is one of the reasons for the growth of the socialist movement. It is not altogether a change of opinions on the issues; to a great extent it is merely a change of alignment.

Speaking of the two millions of young men of the United States who will cast their first votes this fall, the Epworth Herald of September 21 says: "If they all voted the democratic ticket they would elect Governor Wilson. If they all voted the republican ticket they would re-elect the president. If they all voted the progressive ticket they might elect Colonel Roosevelt. If they all voted the socialist ticket they would disturb Europe as well as this country."

To which we might add a couple of lines: If the democratic national convention at Baltimore had nominated a reactionary candidate instead of Governor Wilson, and if the new progressive party had not been formed by republicans dissatisfied with the action of the republican national convention at Chicago, the socialist vote at the coming national election would be large enough to "disturb" the civilized world.

SOCIALISTS MAKING STIR IN POLITICS

Developing Strength that Causes the Other Parties to "Sit Up and Take Notice"

As a class socialists are a law abiding citizens, men who think for themselves and, whether they are correct or not in their theories, they can give you a reason why they are socialists, and it will not be because their daddies and their granddaddies
