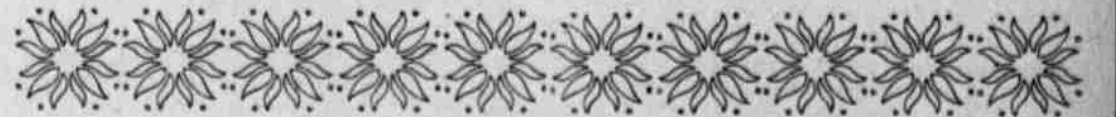

MAY ESTABLISH BRANCH PIANO HOUSE

Prominent Omaha Piano Man Visited Alliance to Look Over Proposition of Establishing Branch Piano House to Sell His Pianos

Wm. Schmoller, head of the firm of Schmoller & Mueller, of Omaha, piano manufacturers and the largest piano house in this part of the west, spent last Thursday afternoon and Friday morning in Alliance with the view of establishing a branch house here to handle the adjacent territory.

Schmoller & Mueller manufacture and sell thousands of high grade pianos every season and now do an extensive business through this territory by means of salesmen and by mail. It is to handle this rapidly increasing business that they are considering the establishment of a large branch house. The pianos would be shipped here in carload lots and distributed from this point.

Mr. Schmoller is a director in the Scottsbluff National Bank of Scottsbluff, Nebr., and visited this bank on this trip. He was accompanied by Mr. Osterberg, another director in the same bank and who is connected with him in the piano business.

Lloyd C. Thomas, of The Herald force, was at one time connected with the firm of Schmoller & Mueller as salesman in charge of the Pianola department.

Ida M. Ross now has the local agency for Schmoller & Mueller and sells their pianos. When the new branch is established she will undoubtedly be connected therewith in a position of responsibility.
