**LIVE STOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA**

**Fat Cattle in Active Demand and 25c Higher for the Week.**

**HOGS FULLY 5 TO 10c HIGHER**

Sheep and Lamb Run Light for Week. Fat Lambs and Sheep 25c Lower Than Week Ago—Feeders Selling at Stronger Prices.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Nov. 15.—Cattle receipts were quite light this week, about 22,000 head being received. There has been a strong, healthy undertone to the trade for fat cattle all week and prices are 25c higher for the week. Inquiry for cows and heifers has been vigorous from start to finish and the bulk of the fair to good butcher and beef stock is going at \$4.50@5.75. Business in stockers and feeders has been of only moderate volume, but a good clearance is probable and closing quotations are right around 15@25c higher for the week.

Cattle quotations: Choice to prime beefs, \$8.75@9.75; good to choice beefs, \$8.25@8.75; fair to good beefs, \$7.25@8.00; common to fair beefs, \$6.00@7.00; good to choice heifers, \$5.75@7.00; good to choice cows, \$5.50@6.50; fair to good grades, \$4.50@5.40; canners and cutters, \$3.25@4.40; veal calves, \$5.00@9.00; bulls, stags, etc., \$1.00@6.00; choice to prime feeders, \$7.00@7.50; good to choice feeders, \$6.25@6.75; fair to good feeders, \$5.75@6.25; common to fair feeders, \$5.00@5.50; stock cows and heifers, \$4.50@6.00; choice to prime fat beefs, \$7.00@8.15; good to choice grass beefs, \$6.50@7.50; fair to good grass beefs, \$6.25@6.75; poor to fair grass beefs, \$5.50@6.00.

About 9,000 hogs were received today, making the total for the five days' foot up 39,000 head. Hogs sold anywhere from steady to a big side higher, with the majority of the offerings being disposed of at a range of \$7.80@7.95, as compared with \$7.75@7.85 Thursday. The best hogs reached \$8.05, a nickel higher than any other market in the country.

Sheep and lamb receipts were rather light for the week, only 82,000 head being received. Both fat sheep and lambs have suffered a decline of about 25c during the week, while anything in the feeder line is selling at stronger prices.
