Notice for Election for Court House Bonds

Notice is hereby given to the qualified voters of Box Butte county, Nebraska, that upon the written request of at least one-fourth of the legal voters of said county, an election will be held at the regular polling places in each precinct of said county, on Tuesday the 18th day of February, 1913, from the hour of eight a. m. to the hour of six p. m., of said day for the purpose of voting upon the following proposition, to-wit:

Shall the County Commissioners of Box Butte county, Nebraska, issue the bonds of said county, in the sum of Sixty Five Thousand (\$65,000) Dollars, of the following denominations, viz: Sixty Five bonds of One Thousand Dollars each to run for a period of twenty years from the date of issuance of said bond, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, said interest and principal payable at the fiscal agency of the state of Nebraska, in New York city, state of New York, said bond issue to be known as "Court House Bond Issue"; said bonds to be issued for the following purpose, to-wit: For the erection and construction of a Fireproof Court House, for the use of said county, to be erected and constructed on lots 22 and 23 in County Addition to the city of Alliance, Box Butte county, Nebraska, according to the recorded plat thereof; and shall said County Commissioners be empowered to make an annual levy for a sufficient amount to pay the interest on said Court House bonds in the sum of Sixty Five Thousand (\$65,000.00) Dollars; and shall said Commissioners be empowered to make an annual levy to create a sinking fund for the payment of the principal of said Sixty Five Thousand (\$65,000.00) Dollars, Court House Bond Issue?
