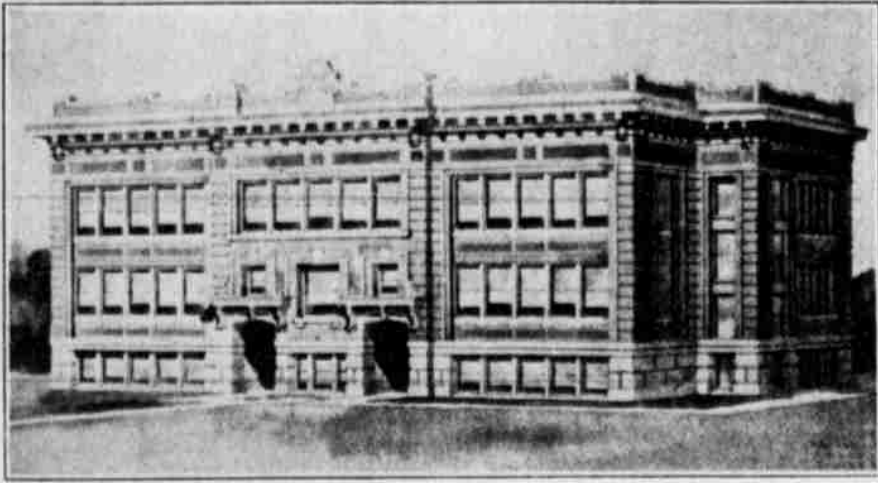


ALLIANCE - CITY OF GOOD SCHOOLS

ALLIANCE is known in Nebraska educational circles as a town of the best advantages obtainable. Second to none in the state, offers all the educational and home life advantages with none of the disadvantages of the large cities. A modern little city, with electric lights and power, city water and sewer, modern conveniences of every kind, and the finest climate in the west. A large modern high school building, a big public school in the west end, known as Emerson school, and a building soon to be erected in place of the burned Central school. A Catholic academy, St. Agnes, known all over

this section for its thorough and excellent work. Think of these facts when you select your home for the education of your family.



Proposed new Central school

Herewith is shown a drawing of the plans which are approved by the Alliance school board for the new Central School building. It will be noted that the building as proposed will be of very beautiful design and one that will be a credit to the city. The outside of the building, according to the plans, will be faced with Edgemont shale brick.

It is planned to have twelve class rooms on the first and second floors of the building, in addition to which will be the principal's office and library. One of the rooms will be very large and used for an assembly hall, on the second floor. In the basement will be located the boys' and girls' toilets, domestic science and manual training class rooms, manual training supply room for tools and lumber, storage room for books, and janitor's quarters. The boiler and fuel room will be entirely separate from the main building and separated by a brick wall, thereby greatly lessening the danger of fire from that source.

It is planned to make the building as nearly fireproof as possible. The approximate cost of this building will be \$35,000.

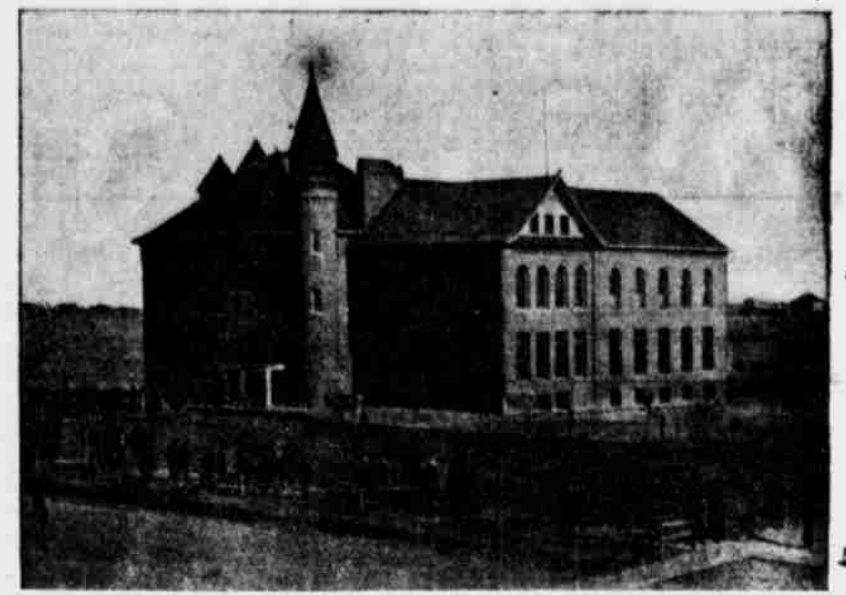
THE ENUMERATION

of the children of school age in Alliance shows 1146—certainly a large number for a town of this size which has so many railroad men. Alliance has 27 teachers, 20 of whom teach in the grade schools, besides the music and art teachers. There are 16 grade teachers in the Emerson building.

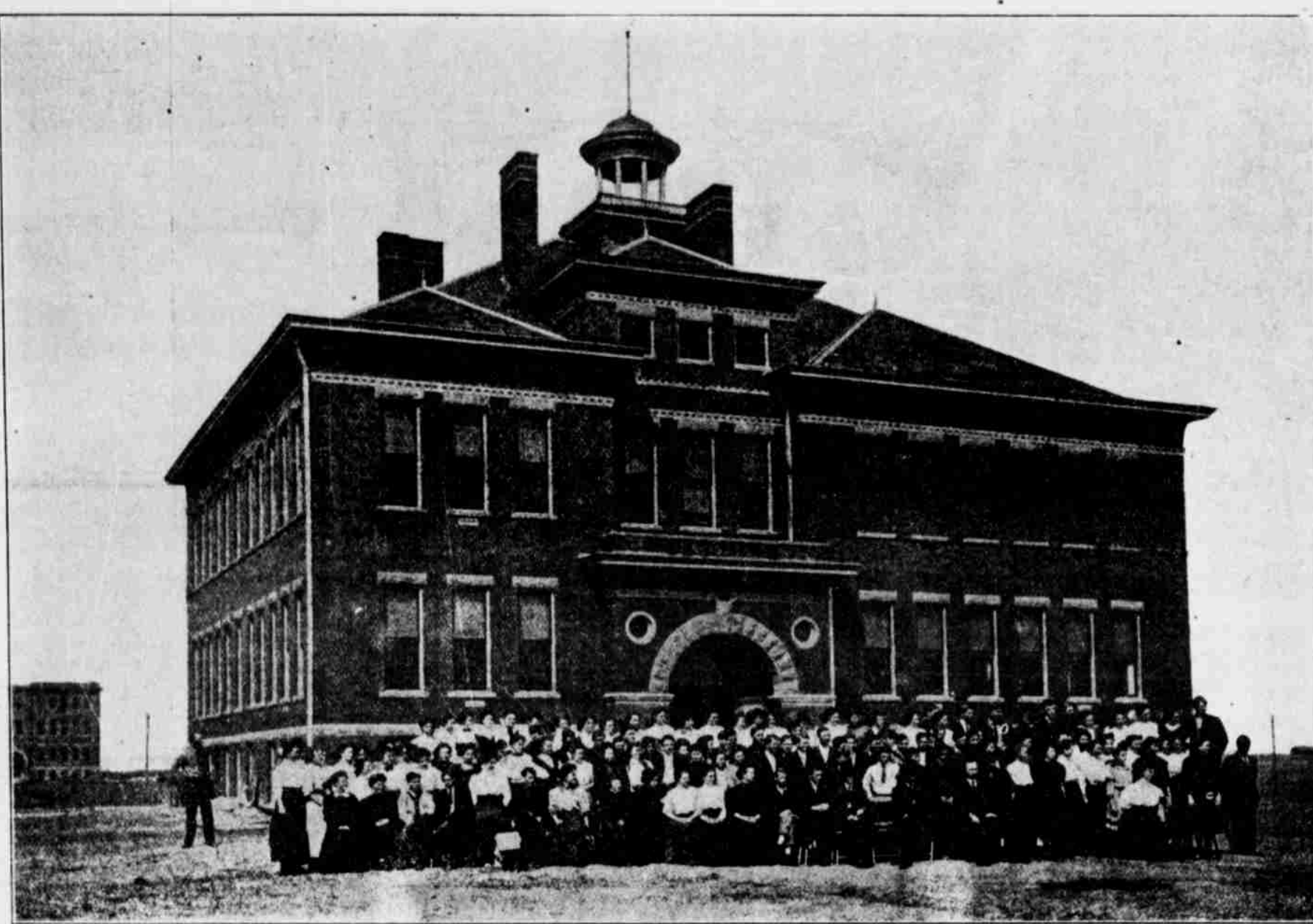

Emerson school, since the completion of the new addition, has an immense amount of room. Bonds have been voted for the erection of a new Central school building, a proposed plan of which is shown here with.

High school education. It is expected, when the new Central school building is completed, to add a complete commercial course and a complete course in agriculture. Manual training is taught in a specially equipped room, furnished with tools, etc., for that purpose, in the Emerson school building.

Alliance High School students take great interest in athletics, and basketball, football and baseball teams vie with each other for prominence. Debating and declamatory contests also take a front rank in the High School. Prof. W. R. Pate, who is an educator of prominence, is superintendent of city schools, and is assisted by an able corps of capable and experienced teachers.

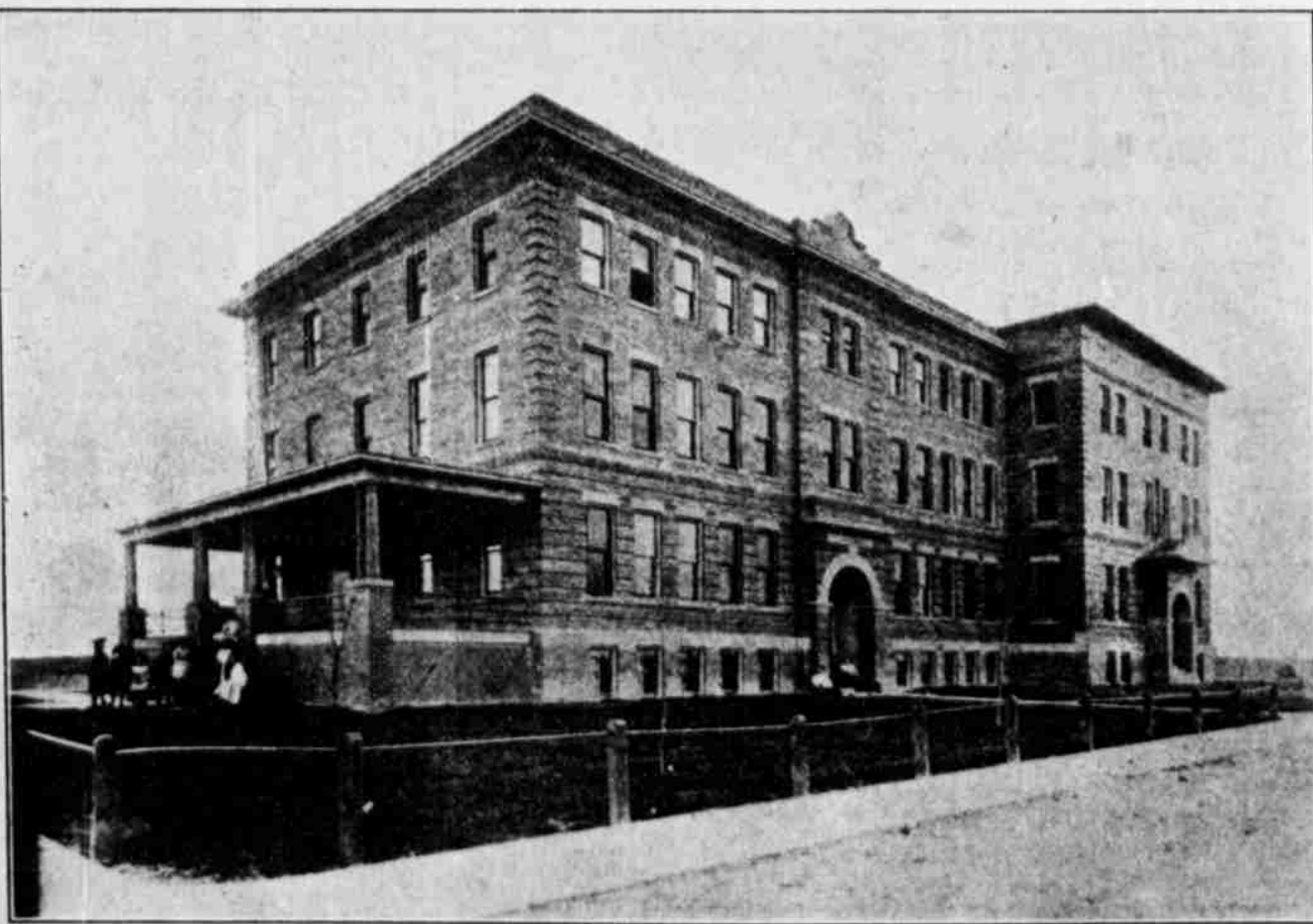
LUTHERAN PAROCHIAL SCHOOL

The parochial school of Immanuel German Evangelical Lutheran church is held from September to June, and is taught by the pastor, Rev. Titus Lang, who is well qualified for the work. The school is held in the church building, northeast corner of Seventh street and Yellowstone avenue. Pupils are instructed in religion, including the church catechism, the German language and the common school branches. There are now about twenty pupils in attendance. The school is in a prosperous condition and giving good satisfaction.

ST. AGNES

Herewith is given a cut of St. Agnes Academy, one of the best arranged and best equipped school buildings of northwestern Nebraska. The splendid location and the careful attention that has been given to the needs of the school have already made it the leading educational institution of the Catholic church in this part of the west, although it has been but a few years since it was established.

St. Agnes Academy offers a complete High School course of twelve grades. 8 class rooms are used in addition to 14 music rooms and the art studio. At the present time there are 98 boarders and 170 day pupils enrolled. A fine, well equipped building, to which a large addition was added recently, makes a fine home for the school. Students attend from Nebraska, Wyoming, Colorado, South Dakota and other adjacent points. The commercial department, in which a modern business course is taught, furnishes our business men with stenographers, bookkeepers and clerical help.
