## THE OMAHA TORNADO

(Continued from page one)

ated. A citizens' relief committee was organized, composed of fifty citizens and an executive committee of seven to work with the seven city councilmen.

Governor Morehead notified Mayor Dahlman that he would send a special message to the legislature asking for the appropriation of sufficient funds to care for the homeless throughout the state.

The citizens' committee has asked the newspapers to accept donations and turn the money over to the committee for distribution.

**13 Dead Taken From Idlewild Hall.**

Bodies of thirteen identified dead have been taken from the ruins of the Idlewild pool hall at Twenty-fourth and Grant, the home of a negro club where probably a score of men were buried under the wreckage of the two story brick building. Fragments of other bodies were unrecognizable. The remains of men were removed in baskets, boxes and pails. Here occurred the most awful mutilation. The building was shattered into a pile of brick and kindling wood.

Six hundred militiamen and regular troops are encamped in this city to guard the ruins. Four hundred militiamen, including 100 from Omaha, were hurriedly assembled along the pathway of the tornado. From Fremont came the signal corps of the state militia, and companies arrived from Lincoln, Fremont, Nebraska City, Wymore and Auburn. Major Hartman is in command of the regulars and Colonel A. D. Peterson is in charge of the state militia.

Two men have been arrested by the police, charged with looting. They gave their names as John Fitch and Arnold Dillon.

### Snow Covers Scenes of Desolation.

The second morning after Omaha's great catastrophe found the city enveloped with a fast falling snow.

At the edges of the devastated district the tramp, tramp, tramp of the soldier sentries made foot prints in the new fallen snow.

Moving vans and burden laden autos were again in evidence. The curiosity inspired visitors had evidently had their querulousness satiated, for few came on the ground as compared with the constant outpouring of the day before.

Friends and neighbors have been taking care of those driven out of their own homes. Pedestrians had to identify themselves and prove that they were bent on legitimate business in order to get through the lines.

At the hospitals and the improvised sick rooms, in the homes of good Samaritans, sorrowful callers came and went—doctors and surgeons upon their missions—fathers, mothers and friends emerging with downcast looks or smiles as the reports received were favorable or discouraging.

Worse reminders of the storm's deadly destruction were the hearse and black funeral carriages winding here and there in sharp contrast with the snow's shining whiteness. In front of every undertaker's shop were gathered from time to time these grim vehicles of grief, signals that the funerals of the victims had begun and that the ceremonies would be the last resting place for all.

### Plan to Rebuild at Once.

Plans for rebuilding the wrecked portions of the city are already under way, a movement to form a corporation for the purpose of aiding those who need it having been already broached by several of the men who are in a position to afford such assistance. Commissioner Ryder, who is in charge of the temporary relief work, realizes that the greatest stress will be felt within the period when reaction from the immediate shock is noted.

### Mayor of Ralston Appeals for Aid

Mayor C. M. Skinner of Ralston has sent an urgent appeal for help to Omaha. He needs clothing and food for the sufferers and also financial aid. He says that the majority of the people turned out of their homes were poor and are now destitute, many not even having clothing to cover their backs. About 200 persons are homeless, without a place to sleep. All the survivors have opened their doors to the unfortunate, but cannot take care of all.

### Norman McCorkle in Path of Storm

Norman McCorkle, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. McCorkle, who has been attending the Moshier-Lampman business college in Omaha, returned to Alliance on No. 41 Wednesday morning. In telling of his experiences during the storm he said to The Herald reporter: "I was rooming at 3216 Lafayette Ave., in Bemis Park, with a family by the name of Banker. Six of us were sitting in the parlor of the house about six o'clock when the electric lights went out. We thought nothing of that but about a minute later a roar burst upon us as though a thousand locomotives were rushing towards the house. It all happened in a few seconds. We did not know what was happening and I ran for the basement stairs. I had gotten down a step or two when Mrs. Banker called to me to come back. I ran back into the parlor. There were six of us all huddled together in a corner, not knowing what was happening, although it seemed as if the world was coming to an end. I was not scared until after it was all over with because it came too quick. The cyclone wrenched the house on its foundations, broke out all the windows and tore up the furniture. Luckily not a one of us in the house was hurt."

### BOY ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

Virgil Wadum, aged 16, was accidentally shot in the abdomen Monday afternoon by a 38 calibre revolver. The gun was under the pillow on a cot in the Phillips livery barn. Archie Phillips had reached under the pillow to pull out the gun and in doing so it was accidentally discharged, the bullet striking Virgil, who was standing nearby. The extent of his injury is not yet known.
