**Potatoes Shipped**

Carload of Box Butte Potatoes went To Omaha Sufferers

As stated in last week's issue of The Herald, J. C. McCorkle was instrumental in raising a fund for the purpose of shipping a carload of Box Butte county potatoes to the Omaha tornado sufferers. Mr. McCorkle secured subscriptions amounting to \$238.50, of which \$197.25 has already been collected. 500 bushels of fine potatoes were purchased, sacked, at 32c per bushel, making the cost of the car \$160. The Burlington donated the freight and the car was sent on Friday. A tag was attached to each sack stating that the potatoes were sent from Box Butte county by its citizens.

There is on hand a balance of \$37.25. This will be forwarded to the World-Herald relief fund and the balance of the money subscribed as soon as paid will be sent to the same fund. Those who have subscribed but not paid can either pay their subscription to J. C. McCorkle or at the First National Bank.
