NEW LAWS OF NEBRASKA

(Continued from Page One.)

H. R. 32, by Mockett—Appropriates \$15,000 for deficiency and emergency repairs at state orthopedic hospital. Emergency.

H. R. 353, by Regan—Appropriates \$50,000 for state penitentiary deficit. Emergency.

H. R. 1, by Hardin—Made the reclassified statutes, compiled by the state reclassification commission, the law of the state. Emergency.

H. R. 362, by Brain, Druesedow, Flanagan, Yates, Sugarman, Foster, Hoff, Anderson—South Omaha charter.

H. R. 538—By Busch of Otoe—Makes fine for selling intoxicants to habitual drunkards, idiots or insane, \$5 to \$100 fine.

H. R. 645, by Grueber of Thayer—Puts the burden of proof, in a case where discrimination in selling price is alleged, on the salesman.

S. F. 306, by Ollis of Valley—Requires attorney general to investigate complaints of discrimination under anti-discrimination law, whenever request is made.

H. R. 98, by Mockett of Lancaster—Appropriates \$1,000 for relief of John Keane, penitentiary employe injured by falling through trap door. Signed April 13.

H. R. 177, by O'Malley of Hall—Makes it a misdemeanor to exhibit a wild man or wild woman, any deformed person or any immodest or immoral show.

H. R. 135, by O'Malley of Hall—Appropriates \$2,000 for relief of Mrs. Ruby Carson, injured in laundry machine at Grand Island soldiers' home.

H. R. 252, by Flanagan of Douglas—Appropriates \$5,000 for Guard Doody of state penitentiary, injured during convict outbreak.

H. R. 262, by Pearson of Frontier—Changes the minimum school year of three months to four months in districts of fewer than twenty pupils, eight months for twenty to twenty-five pupils and nine months in districts having a greater number.

H. R. 130, by Mockett of Lancaster—Provides that whenever the parents of fifty or more pupils of the graded schools submit a petition three months prior to opening of term, authorities must establish a course in any European modern language designated by parents for pupils above the fourth grade; for not more than five hours each week and not less than one period each day to be devoted to such study; this act applicable to every high school, city school or metropolitan school of the state.

H. R. 69, by Hoffmeister of Chase—Changes the number of petitioners to call an election to vote bonds for a county high school from twenty-five in each precinct to one-third of the qualified voters of each precinct.

H. R. 41, by Mockett of Lancaster—Permits county board of Lancaster county to improve roads within corporate limits of city of Lincoln, when such roads are extensions of improved highways. Emergency.

H. R. 329, by Stebbins of Dawson—Changes conditions of bond issues for purchase of school house site. Emergency.

H. R. 415, by McKissick and Hoff—Increases salary of hotel commissioner from \$5 to \$1,000 a year; authorizes expenditures of not more than \$12,000 for assistants, this amount to be paid out of fees collected by department.

H. R. 554, by Elmelund of Saunders—Requires a reserve of 20 per cent by all state banks in cities of over 25,000 inhabitants.

H. R. 229, by Haak of Butler—Requires county officials to pay annually to county treasurer all fees collected in excess of what law allows them as salaries.

H. R. 154, by Lancaster delegation—Permits city of Lincoln to purchase or construct municipal street-railway, gas or other public utility plant. Emergency.

H. R. 51, by Richardson of Lancaster—Makes it a felony to introduce "dope" or intoxicants into penitentiary, reformatories, jails or asylums. Emergency.

H. R. 173, by Reuter of Otoe—Substitutes electrocution for hanging as death penalty after October 1, 1914.

H. R. 112, by Searle of Keith—In counties not under township organization, county board is authorized to appropriate unexpended balance from precinct bond levy, to be used for road improvement in such precinct.

H. R. 341, by Reische of Dawes—Appropriates money in state normal library fund for purchase of books for Chadron normal. Emergency.

H. R. 684, by Douglas county delegation—Authorizes governor to appoint three commissioners to act with Iowa commissioners in defining boundary between Douglas and Sarpy counties, Nebraska, and Pottawatomie county, Iowa.

H. R. 887, by the governor—Appropriates \$100,000 for the relief of tornado sufferers and to pay militia, to be expended by the following commission: Arthur C. Smith, Omaha; Robert Cowell of Omaha; Arthur Mullen of Omaha; William A. Redick of Omaha; William Miller, Sr., of Yutan; S. H. Buck of Otoe county; P. L. Hall of Lincoln. Emergency.

H. R. 613, by Stearns of Scotts Bluff—Allows lessee of any school land, any part of which is under irrigation, to purchase same.

H. R. 691, by Mockett of Lancaster—Authorizes the governor to appoint a commission of three to investigate the feasibility of reforestation of school lands in the sand hills.

H. R. 748, by Keckley of York—Allows cities of 5,000 inhabitants to vote not more than \$100,000 bonds for the drainage of natural water courses. Emergency.

H. R. 447, by Elmelund of Saunders—Allows banks to loan not to exceed ten times the capital stock and surplus. Emergency.

H. R. 46, by Bollen of Knox and Cedar—A proposed constitutional amendment permitting five-sixths of a jury to render a verdict in all civil cases and in criminal cases less than felonies; legislature may authorize a trial by jury of less than twelve men in courts inferior to the district courts.

H. R. 20, by Richardson of Lancaster—Allows railroads or express companies to transport household goods of employes free of charge. Emergency.

H. R. 151, by Knudson of Nance—Removes exemption of wages where debt is contracted for necessities of life; execution for wages shall not issue until judgment is rendered.

H. R. 57, by Regan of Platte—Requires all "light" locomotives to be manned by engineer, fireman and conductor or pilot when running from one division point to another.

H. R. 42, by Hardin of Harlan—Permits the owner of a bull, stallion or jack to hold a lien for service upon the dam, as well as the off-spring.

H. R. 27, by Simon of Douglas—Provides that widow of Omaha policeman shall be paid a pension of not less than \$20 a month, unless remarried; minor orphaned children similarly pensioned.

H. R. 15, by Fries of Howard—Provides a penalty of from \$10 to \$50 and liability for damages for imitating any "corner" established by the federal government in the survey of public lands in Nebraska. Emergency.

H. R. 14, by Fries of Howard—Provides that county roads shall be marked by surveyors on both sides. Emergency.

H. R. 13, by Fries of Howard—In boundary disputes, gives state surveyor the right to summon witnesses, administer oaths and compel testimony. Emergency.

H. R. 12, by Fries of Howard—Prescribes methods of establishing or restoring lost or obliterated corners. Emergency.

H. R. 220, by Hartwell of Webster—Requires proprietor of pool hall outside of incorporated city or village to obtain license from county board, on petition of at least thirty freeholders of precinct wherein it is to be located, after publication of application in newspaper of general circulation for at least two weeks.

H. R. 179, by Hoffmeister of Chase—Requires woven wire fish net or screen at headgates of every irrigation ditch, mesh not over one inch.

H. R. 416, by McKissick and Hoff—Gives hotel keepers a lien on baggage of guests for unpaid board bills; liability for loss of guests' valuables limited to \$300, even if kept in hotel safe, unless by special agreement; in case of destruction by fire, liability limited to \$10 for each grip and contents and \$50 for each trunk and contents.

H. R. 124, by Nichols of Madison—Repeals the law requiring the filing in supreme court in appeal cases of printed abstracts of bills of exception. Emergency.

H. R. 235, by Jackson of Jackson—Prohibits the misuse by any other than the owner thereof of name, mark or brand on receptacles used in the sale of soda water, mineral, aerated waters, cider, ginger ale and other non-intoxicating beverages, milk, buttermilk, cream, ice cream and butter; prohibits the theft thereof and provides for searching of premises to find same. Emergency.

H. R. 204, by Haak of Butler—Substitutes town treasurer for assessor as member of town board. Emergency.

H. R. 122, by Buckner of Lancaster—Authorizes state board of health to prohibit use of common public drinking cups.

H. R. 11, by Fries of Howard—Judges and clerks of election and canvassers shall receive thirty cents an hour for not more than twenty hours, party making returns to county clerk to receive five cents per mile traveled; in cities of first class, judges and clerks to receive \$5 a day.

H. R. 116, by Mallory of Box Butte—Requires railroads to equip all switch-stands with lights between hours of sunset and sunrise and in times of dark weather.

H. R. 382, by Baker of Thomas—Raises salaries of court reporters from \$1,500 to \$2,000 a year.

H. R. 380, by Bartels of Wayne, Kaufman of Nemaha, Harris of Buffalo, Hostetler of Buffalo and Reische of Dawes—Appropriates cash funds of four state normal schools to current expense funds.

H. R. 267, by Nichols of Madison—Affidavits explaining or correcting any apparent defects in a chain of title to any real estate may be recorded as instruments affecting real estate and such record shall be prima facie evidence of the fact therein recited; all such instruments now on record are legalized.

H. R. 263, by Pearson of Frontier—Raises maximum levy for school district from twenty-five to thirty-five mills.

H. R. 56, by Harris of Buffalo—Appropriates library cash fund of Kearney state normal to current library fund of that institution.

H. R. 21, by Fuller of Seward—Requires physical connection of all telephone lines; exchanges on which long distance call originates to have the right to designate the route of traffic; requires that long distance rates be based on an air-line mileage, 15 per cent of any toll charge to go to the originating line, 10 per cent to the terminating line and the balance divided between the different companies over which the message is routed; provides for a clearing house for division of rates.

H. R. 125, by Bartels of Wayne—Appropriates Wayne normal library fund for purchase of books.

H. R. 76, by Anderson of Kearney—Prohibits the marriage of whites with persons one-eighth or more negro, Japanese or Chinese.

H. R. 637, by house finance committee—Makes a levy of 85 hundredths of a mill for the salaries, maintenance and improvement of the four state normal schools; distribution to be at the discretion of the state normal board both as to maintenance and new buildings. Emergency.

H. R. 36, by Jackson of Nuckolls—Names of candidates nominated at a primary election shall not be placed on the official ballot unless the candidate accepts the nomination in writing, within ten days when
