Commissioners Proceedings

Alliance, Nebr., May 20th, 1913. THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS met pursuant to the call of the Clerk. Officers present S. C. Reek, Chairman; and C. L. Hashman.

The claim of County Superintendent in the amount of \$109.00, for County appropriation for Junior Normal, as per Chapter 51, Article 11733 Cobber's Statutes 1911, was allowed, and the Clerk ordered to draw warrant for same.

The County Treasurer was ordered to transfer ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS from the Bridge Fund to the General Fund.

The Road petition signed by Frank Vaughns, et al, asking that a public road be laid out commencing at the southeast corner of section thirteen (13), between section thirteen (13) and twenty-four (24) in township twenty-six (26), North range forty-eight (48), W., thence west on section line to the south-west corner of section eighteen (18), in township twenty-six (26), North range forty-nine (49), W., between sections eighteen (18) and nineteen (19), in township twenty-six (26), North range forty-nine (49) West, was approved and deposit waived.

There being nothing further to come before the Board at this time they adjourned to the call of the Clerk.

SECURES PATENT ON HARNESS BUCKLE

E. C. Drake, vice president of The Herald Publishing Company, who is of an inventive turn of mind, Wednesday morning received notice that he had been allowed a patent on an improved form of harness buckle. The technical description of the buckle is as follows:

1,061,955. HARNESS BUCKLE. Emmett C. Drake and Ellsha S. Brown, Blockton, Iowa. Filed June 12, 1911. Serial No. 632,702. (Cl. 24-174.)

A harness buckle, designed for use with straps having holes therein, comprising a central buckle member constructed with parallel S shaped sides, integral end members connecting said sides, two end buckle members each comprising parallel sides, the ends of which are curved at obtuse angles to the main bodies thereof, an end member connecting said sides at one end thereof, a lug on said end member extending at right angles from the plane in which the main portion of said end buckle member lies, a cross member connecting said sides near the middle thereof, a second end member connecting said curved ends, said end buckle members being designed to be detachably mounted on opposite ends of said central buckle member, with the end of the central buckle member received between the cross member of the end buckle member and the said end buckle members being arranged with their curved ends away from the central buckle member in opposite directions.

Mr. Drake has already received a couple of offers for his patent.

SLAGLE IS VINDICATED

(Continued from First Page.)

wood regarding their business relations, that he knew mistakes were made on the books and Dr. Bellwood knew it and that Dr. Bellwood made many mistakes himself. And that they had talked about checking up the books but that no complete check of the books had ever been made by them. That Dr. Bellwood wanted him to buy out Dr. Bellwood for \$5,000 and that he refused to do so.

Dr. Slagle stated that he came to stay three months and that Dr. Bellwood kept him after that time. That he collected and paid bills. That he made some of the entries in the books and that Miss Bullock and Dr. Bellwood also did the same thing. That they all forgot things and made mistakes. That Dr. Bellwood tried to make him sign an agreement to leave town within twenty-four hours after he came back from the east and that he refused to do so. That he made a full and complete settlement for \$1650, the receipt for which was shown to the court and that he thought that settled the matter. That his cancelled checks, which he had kept in his desk, were missing and that they would show what the money was paid out for. That there was no secrecy whatever about the books, that they were kept in both his office and Dr. Bellwood's, and were never locked up.

Dr. Slagle was cross examined relative to the handwriting on the books. He testified he had made some of the entries, others he was unable to state. Some of them were Dr. Bellwood's and some were Miss Bullock's.

Miss Edna Bullock

Miss Edna Bullock was the best witness for the defense and told a straightforward account of the different transactions. She testified she had done most of the bookkeeping and that there were many mistakes on the books; that Dr. Bellwood told her at one time that if the books were checked up, Dr. Slagle would owe him \$1,000. No complete check was made of the books at any time. That people would come in, complain about their bills, saying they had paid them and that they would all get together and try to straighten it out. That they all talked about the mistakes on the books and that she, as well as the others, neglected to make many entries she was told of. Sometimes the books were not fixed up for days, perhaps a week. That all were in Dr. Bellwood's own office. That she left Dr. Bellwood's employ because he wanted her to tell everyone who came to the office that Dr. Slagle was a thief. Her evidence created a profound impression on the court, it appeared.

E. H. Boyd was called as the next witness. He was followed by Ed. Brennan, who gave evidence from notes taken during the grand jury session last spring. He was clerk of the grand jury. Fred Blair was called as a witness.

Dr. Bellwood was recalled to the stand and asked regarding the testimony of Messrs. Newberry, Hampton and Tash and as to whether or not these men told the truth. He said they were mistaken. The defendant rested.

Arguments by Counsel

Last evening was devoted to argument by the counsel on both sides. Not in many years has so large a crowd filled the court room in the Box Butte county court house. Nor so much oratory been poured forth for the benefit of one man—Judge Gregory Turner. He gave both sides ample opportunity to render all the evidence they desired and certainly gave an impartial hearing.

Mr. Burton's Speech

County Attorney Burton was at his best. With flashing eyes and a voice full of emotion he reviewed the evidence from start to finish. He had the difficult task of prosecuting a man against whom the evidence did not show criminal intent but he did his best and no one can accuse him of not doing his duty. He stated that very few cases came up in court here in which so many friends of the parties concerned were involved. He read from the Nebraska laws defining embezzlement and larceny. He claimed that 13 different counts against the defendant were admitted and that Dr. Slagle admitted his own handwriting on many entries.

E. H. Boyd

E. H. Boyd spoke first for the defense. He quoted law from ten different law books and made a very clear and concise statement of his view of the law in the case. He showed that there must have been a criminal intent and that in this case Dr. Slagle had not refused to settle and neither had he attempted or attempted to conceal the books. He showed how much Dr. Slagle owed and that the \$1650 paid was merely a guess at it and all that Dr. Bellwood asked in settlement. Mr. Boyd's points, summed up, were that the court must believe there was evidence to prove Dr. Slagle guilty before binding him over, that there never was a settlement, that the books were not reliable, that Dr. Bellwood was the most careless of all, that there was no criminal intent on Dr. Slagle's part, that Slagle's desk was never locked, that Dr. Slagle gave checks for expenses and gave receipts for money received, that the expert accountant only found a difference of approximately \$200, that Edna Bullock took on herself a large portion of blame for the mistakes, and that professional men are always poor business men and have the habit of keeping books very poorly.

C. C. Barker

C. C. Barker made one of the most eloquent appeals that we have ever heard before a court of law. He reviewed the case and in an eloquent and masterly way presented the evidence shown for the consideration of the court, showed how that I looked as though an attempt was being made to drive Dr. Slagle from the city and how that it appeared as though Dr. Slagle was the one who was being sinned against.

During his speech a pin could have been heard drop in any part of the room, so intently interested was the audience, court and officials. At one time he was interrupted by a round of applause when the audience, forgetting where they were, gave vent to their feelings. He reviewed the testimony of the different witnesses for the state and brought out the flaws in their testimony.

Judge L. A. Berry reviewed the case for the defense, emphasizing the arguments presented and bringing out new points. He stated that in his opinion this case should never have been brought.

At the close of Burton's next argument, Judge Zurn asked Dr. Slagle to stand on his feet, and amid an impressive silence he said, "Dr. Slagle, I find you not guilty."
