GHEENT, Belgium, June 1.—Georges Carpentier, the French heavyweight pugilist, won the heavyweight championship of Europe today by knocking out Bombardier Wells, the British champion, in the fourth round.



Carpentier himself took the count of nine in the first round and was sent to the floor again in the second.

In the third round the French man discovered the weak stomach of Bombardier, and, showering blows in the midsection, crumpled up the Englishman. He ended the fight with a right hand punch to the solar plexus just before the end of the fourth.

The bout was scheduled for twenty rounds. Carpentier is a light heavyweight who only recently was middleweight champion of Europe and previous to that welterweight champion of France. The Englishman had a considerable advantage in weight and height. It will be remembered that Wells made two invasions to this country to cop the heavyweight championship. His first try-out being with Al Falzer, being defeated by knockout. His second try was a duplicate of the first experience, meeting "Gunboat" Smith with the same result. By his defeat from the hands of Carpentier, a middleweight, marks him out of the running. Since the death of Luther McCarty, it leaves the white heavies in quite a muddle to know who is who. Gunboat Smith is claiming the honor but I don't believe him capable of making good. Eastern match makers are trying to hook him up with Jim Flynn. In case they are matched for ten rounds or better I would choose Flynn to win.

Zediker Freed

Erwin Zediker, who was arrested the last of the week, charged with robbing the Diamond pool hall, was not bound over by Justice Schlupp at the preliminary hearing but was released at the close of the hearing Tuesday afternoon, Justice Schlupp finding that there was not enough evidence shown to bind him over to the district court.

The hearing started Monday evening in Justice Schlupp's court room in the McCorkle block, and was attended by quite a crowd. A number of witnesses were heard for both sides. The prosecution endeavored to show that certain coins were those which had been found in the possession of Zediker and were the identical coins which had been stolen from the pool hall. The whereabouts of the gun and watch which were stolen have not been discovered. The prosecution also endeavored to show that a button had been torn from Zediker's coat and left on the window sill, proving that he had entered by the window.

Witnesses for the defense testified that Zediker had been elsewhere at the time the robbery was alleged to have been committed and showed that he was a collector of old coins and that he had a large number of them at his home.

Attorney J. L. Westover represented the state and attorneys Boyd and Metz the defendant.

City Fathers met Tuesday evening for the transaction of official Business

TO IMPROVE STREET LIGHTING

The regular meeting of the city council was held at the city hall on Tuesday evening. A good crowd was present in the council chamber. All councilmen were present. It was decided to grant the right to give concessions on the streets to the entertainment committee, they to grant the licenses for the convention, and to receive the receipts therefrom. It was voted to collect in the future for water used at the fair grounds. The council donated the sum of \$25 to the band for the month of June. This amount will be paid to the band for the two succeeding months, in return for which the band is to give street concerts Saturday evenings.

Rev. J. H. Brown spoke in regard to the Sunday closing ordinance. An ordinance has been drawn up in accordance with a motion carried at the last meeting, prohibiting Sunday amusements, but it could not be located at the meeting and the matter was carried over.

T. J. Threlkeld presented bill for fumigating work, \$27 of which was allowed. Mr. Threlkeld refused to take this amount for the work, stating that it would not pay for the materials used, and demanded the return of his bill, stating that he was going to sue the city for the amount of the bill.

Councilman Romig brought up the question of a light for the corner of 6th and Missouri Avenue. Mayor Rodgers spoke regarding a light near first and Niobrara. On motion street lights were ordered installed at both points. M. E. Grebe brought up the question of lights around the high school and Academy. On motion this was referred to the committee on lights.

Reports of city officers and bills allowed will be published in the next issue.
