HOOKER COUNTY SUICIDE CELEBRATION AT BAYARD

Former Alliance Man Takes Own Life After Losing Sum of Money Drinking and Gambling

TOM O'CONNOR OF HECLA

Tom O'Connor of Hecla, Neb., committed suicide on Thursday of last week, after becoming violently insane as a result of trouble and excessive drinking. It is said that he was an express messenger on the Burlington between Alliance and Denver some years ago. He was not a relative of the people of the same name now residing in Alliance.

The following account of the rash deed is taken from the Hooker County Tribune of last Friday, published at Mullen:

Thomas C. O'Connor, 27 years of age, and left alone in the world with a little three-year old daughter, having lost his wife in Custer county when the child was but two months old, took his own life at the home of W. W. Woodruff, five miles south of Hecla, between 10 and 12 o'clock a. m., Wednesday, by slashing his throat on both sides with a razor.

O'Connor recently inherited \$2,500 from his father's estate and returned from Custer county Tuesday, where it is thought he had drunk and gambled the greater part of it away. He had acted strangely since his return and a short time before he committed the deed became so violent that Mr. Woodruff went to Hecla to summon Dr. Adams, who left on 43 for Hecla. Homer Coombs and Mrs. Woodruff were left to care for O'Connor, but the woman became frightened and went to a neighbor's. Coombs had gone to summon help from other neighbors when the deed took place.

The dead man had always borne a good reputation around Hecla, and by many it is thought that grief over the loss of his wife caused his mind to become unbalanced. The verdict of the coroner's jury attaches no motive for the crime to anyone. The remains were brought to Mullen.

Two sisters, a brother-in-law and mother of the dead man's wife, are here as we go to press to make arrangements for the disposal of the body, and may decide to take it to Custer county for burial.

WOULD NOT GIVE WOMEN THE BALLOT

(By the United Press)

VIENNA, June 25.—The real reason for the suffragette outrages in England has been discovered. Lecturing in the Vienna Urania, Dr. Julius Pokorny today explained why modern England afforded such fertile ground for "this extraordinary psychical epidemic." The fact that similar political and economic conditions existed in other countries led the Professor to conclude that "the true origin of this fanatical barbarism is to be found in the ancient civilization of the British Isles."

"Among the original inhabitants of England," he said, "women occupied a domineering position. She spent her life in boundless liberty. Now, this original population, in contrast with that of the rest of western Europe, has managed to remain comparatively pure, whereas there has been constant retrogression of the Anglo-Saxon stock. In London, for instance, only one-seventh of the people are blond. It is no wonder, therefore, that 1,400 years of Anglo-Saxon rule has not sufficed to keep back instincts which for more than 4,000 years were permitted to develop unhindered among the original inhabitants."
