### SOME LIGHT ON CATALOG PRICES

When a mail order house sends a catalog out, the prices therein are fixed to the mail order customer until another catalog is issued, which is generally a year later. In this connection it might be a little surprising and at the same time not pleasant for customers of Chicago mail order houses to learn that Chicagoans many times have the opportunity of getting the same merchandise much cheaper than the catalog customer. Recently a Chicago mail order house carried in the Chicago papers an advertisement which said:

#### Half Catalog Prices

Women's \$6.50 Coats at \$3.85  
There are coats in melton, kersley, etc. They have large collars and are well made. We priced them in our catalog at \$6.50, tomorrow, special at \$3.85  
Women's Coats, seal plush, shawl collar and cuffs of caracul, catalog price \$9.50, special at \$4.75  
Women's Coats, plush, boucle and fancy mixtures, full length and 3/4 models, most of them lined thruout, collar and cuffs of sealette plush, catalog price \$15, special for tomorrow at \$7.75  
These price differences the mail order customer in towns away from Chicago might well think seriously about.

### DANGER IN NEGLECT OF MILK

The United States Department of Agriculture recently issued a bulletin on the care of milk that points out some of the dangers that lie in neglectful handling of that commodity. There is a great deal in the bulletin of interest to milk users. The following paragraphs are especially suggestive:

No matter how carefully milk is handled between the farm and the home, or in how pure a state it is delivered at the domestic ice box, it quickly can become an undesirable food if carelessly handled in the home. Milk that is left for only a short time in summer heat may become unfit for use.

Milk must be kept cool to prevent the bacteria already in it, and which may get in it by accident from multiplying to a point where the milk is undesirable.

Milk should be taken into the house and put in the refrigerator as soon after delivery as possible. If it is impossible to have the bottles of milk put immediately in the refrigerator, provide on the porch a box containing a lump of ice.

In planning a house, arrange to have the refrigerator set in the wall with an opening on the outside. It is always possible to provide locks doors, and supply the milkman with one key.

### CANNOT FIND LOST MONEY

Sister of Miser at Valentine Gives up Hope of Locating Hoard of Hidden Gold

VALENTINE, Nebr., Jan. 17.—Miss F. J. Emory, sister of J. C. Emory, alias "Windy" Emory, who died here in October, has given up all hope of ever locating the hoard of gold which old "Windy" is said to have hidden.

Emory was a graduate of a well known Pennsylvania college and was well educated. Altho he made a great deal of money from his hogs and from clerical and other work, not forgetting the graveyard, which he owned and cared for, he was never known to spend a cent, not even for food and clothing, which he begged for as a rule.

Shortly before his death the officials of this city began preparations for a lawsuit against him, to compel him to sell his graveyard to the city at a reasonable price. But "Windy" never worried and just continued work on a cement tombstone. Nobody knew whom the stone was for, altho it was rumored that it was for himself. He never finished it, however, dying before its completion.

Burial of Little Boy and Two Men in Greenwood Cemetery Since Saturday Noon

#### Reuben Lies

The funeral of little Reuben Lies, the year and a half old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Lies, was held from the home at 401 Yellowstone avenue, Saturday afternoon, conducted by Rev. O. S. Baker, pastor of the First M. E. church. Burial was in Greenwood cemetery.

#### Frank O. McFarland

The funeral of Frank Orly McFarland, whose death was announced in Saturday's Daily, was held at the Baptist church at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Frank C. Barrett, under the auspices of the A. F. & A. M. lodge of which he was an honored member. He was also a member of the M. W. A. He was an active Christian and affiliated with the Baptist church, altho not enrolled as a member on account of some slight difference of opinion on the question of faith.

Deceased was born at Stanton, Nebraska, June 1, 1875. In 1900 he came to Alliance, and on Nov. 19, 1902, was married to Edith Fern Fielding. To them were born five children. Other near relatives left to mourn his demise are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Thomas McFarland of Stanton, Nebr.; three brothers, Harry A., Vance I. and Grant E. McFarland, all of Stanton; and seven sisters, Mrs. Inez Becker, Mrs. Effie Best and Mrs. Alice Wise, all of Belgrade, Nebr.; Mrs. Clara Best of Norfolk, Nebr.; and the Misses Faye, Ursula and Millie McFarland of Stanton. The parents and one brother and one sister, Harry and Faye, arrived in Alliance yesterday and were present at the funeral.

Frank McFarland was one of Alliance's most highly esteemed citizens, and will be universally mourned by the large number of people of city and country who knew him. In respect to his memory the post office was closed in the afternoon from 1 to 3 o'clock.

#### William Albert Payne

William Albert Payne, cousin of L. F. Smith of Alliance, was born at LaPorte, Ind., Oct. 26, 1854; died at the home of his sister, Mrs. D. A. Fossey, in Morrill, Nebr., January 17, 1914. Funeral service was held Sunday afternoon in the Methodist church of Morrill, conducted by the pastor, under auspices of the A. O. U. W. lodge, of which he was a member. He was also a member of the Christian church.

On Oct. 29, 1887, the deceased was married to Miss Susan Carter, twelve miles southwest of Nonpareil, in Box Butte county, where they resided about three years. He worked in the Burlington shops in Alliance for a while, and about seventeen years ago established the first laundry in this city, moving from here to the Black Hills in South Dakota, where he spent ten years in the employ of the Homestake Mining Co. For the last six or seven years he and his wife resided on a farm near Morrill.

His remains were brought to Alliance for interment in Greenwood cemetery, near the last resting place of his parents and a little child.

Those present at the burial from out of Alliance were the widow and an adopted daughter; E. D. Payne, only living brother of Lemmons, S. D.; Mr. and Mrs. Warren Prentice of Torrington, Wyo.; and A. L. Carter of Sargent, Nebr.

#### WAIT WILL NOT ACCEPT PAPERS

Secretary of State Refuses to Accept Papers Filed by Lieutenant Governor McKelvie

LINCOLN, Nebr., Jan. 17.—Secretary of State Wait still refuses to accept the papers of Lieutenant Governor McKelvie, who is the first to file as a candidate for the nomination of governor at the primaries in August. The secretary of state based his refusal on his construction of the law which indicates that no present state officer is eligible to another office during the period of his incumbency.

Lieutenant Governor McKelvie announced he had engaged counsel and will begin a mandamus suit to compel the acceptance of the filing fees and papers.

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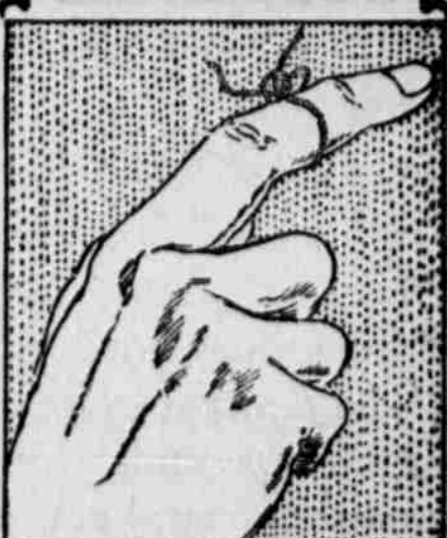
