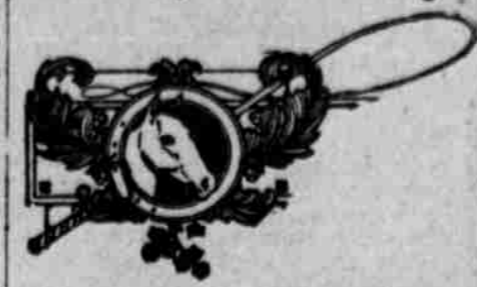

RUMER TO BUILD NEW BLOCK

New Building to Be Erected on Box Butte Avenue Near Corner of Fourth Street

W. D. Rumer has completed all arrangements for the erection of a new two story brick block on his property on Box Butte avenue near the corner of Fourth street. The tenants occupying the old building are moving out and the work of razing it will start within a few days. The new building will be 50x110 feet. Twenty-eight feet on the front will be built two stories to accommodate several commodious office rooms. The ground floor will be occupied by a modern theatre. On each side of the entrance will be two rooms, each 18x26 feet. One of these rooms will be occupied by Joe Smith for confectionery and soft drinks, the other has been leased to E. W. Ray, the florist.

The front of the theatre will be modern in every respect. The box office will occupy the center with doorways on each side leading from the lobby into the theatre. The floor of the lobby will be tile. The
