COMING PRIMARIES IN OREGON

General Primary Election Three Weeks Distant in Oregon but Campaign Stirring

Portland, Ore., April 29.—Altho the general primary election is still three weeks distant, the campaign is already stirring the state from end to end, and all signs point to the warmest primary battle ever staged in Oregon. To begin with, the voters will have the longest list of candidates from which to make their selections at the primary, ever presented in the state. The ballots will contain the names of 252 aspirants for state and district offices. Of this number 195 are Republicans, 45 are Democrats and 14 are Progressives. Two years ago there were only 125 Republicans and 58 Democrats on the ballot.

Nominations will be made in the primaries for United States senator, representatives in congress, governor, state treasurer, attorney general, superintendent of public instruction, state engineer, railroad commissioner, superintendents of water divisions, commissioner of labor statistics and inspector of factories and workshops, supreme and circuit court justices and members of the legislature.

United States Senator George E. Chamberlain, whose term will expire next March, is the choice of the Democratic party for re-election. Opposed to him in the election next fall will be R. A. Booth, of Eugene, as the Republican candidate, and William Hanley, of Boring, as the choice of the Progressive party.

Many of the Democrats now holding state and other offices are unopposed for renomination and this has left the majority of the contests to the Republicans and Progressives. At the present time the contests for the nominations for governor overshadow all other features of the primary campaign. There are fifteen candidates out for the gubernatorial nominations, the largest number seeking any office in the state. Of these eight are Republicans, five are Democrats and two are Progressives, so that the contests in all three parties are of the keenest sort.

As a general rule, there is little or nothing to interest the average citizen in political interests until the contest reaches fever heat a few days before the nominations are made at the primary election, but there are peculiar conditions existing in Oregon politics at the present time, and the skirmishes among the numerous aspirants for the governorship have been viewed with more than ordinary interest for many weeks.

In the first place, Governor Oswald West, who is a Democrat, is not a candidate for renomination. This naturally has precipitated a scramble among the Democrats to succeed him. The same fact has encouraged an unusually large number of Republicans to seek the nomination, on the theory that a newcomer heaving the Democratic ticket will be easier to defeat than would Governor West standing for re-election.

The Republicans seeking the nomination for governor are: Grant B. Dimick, a former mayor of Oregon City; A. M. Crawford of Roseburg, who is attorney-general for Oregon; William A. Carter, an attorney of Portland; T. T. Geer of Portland, who was governor of Oregon in 1899 to 1903; Dr. James Withcombe, of Corvallis; Charles A. Johns, of Portland; Gus C. Moser, an attorney of Portland, and George C. Brownell, an attorney and former state senator of Oregon City.

The Democrats whose names will appear on the ballot for nomination for governor are: John Manning of Portland, former district attorney for Multnomah county; Dr. C. J. Smith, a former state senator of Pendleton; A. S. Bennett, an attorney of The Dalles; Col. Robert A. Miller, an attorney of Portland, and G. A. Cobb, also of Portland.

F. M. Gill of Portland and L. K. McMahon of Salem are the two Progressives who are contesting for the nomination of their party for governor.

Former Governor Geer and Geo. C. Brownell, both of whom are aspirants for the Republican nomination for governor, are making their campaigns on state-wide prohibition platforms.

For supreme court justices there is a spirited contest for the Republican nominations, with practically no contest in the other two parties. The contests for the nominations for attorney general and labor commissioner also are confined to the Republicans. There will be no contests in the primaries for the nominations for United States senator, representative in the Second congressional district, state treasurer, state school superintendent and superintendents of the two water divisions, as none of the candidates have opposition in their own party.
