

MAN LEAPS FROM TRAIN

Forrest Graham of Lead, S. D. leaped from his berth thru the window of a Pullman on No. 42 yesterday evening and was badly injured. The accident happened just west of Ardmore. Mr. Graham has been in poor health for several months from the result of which he became mentally depressed and at times irrational. It was thought that if he were taken to a lower altitude his condition would improve. Yesterday morning his brother, E. R. Graham, started for Westphalia Mo. with him. They reach Edgemont without accident but shortly after they left there while they were preparing to retire, the young man complained of the car being too warm and asked his brother to raise the window. He

complied with the request but the outer window stuck and required considerable effort to raise it. When it did open it shot up suddenly clear to the top and without warning the young man leaped thru it head foremost. As he jumped his brother managed to get hold of his hand and held for a short time in that manner after he was on the outside of the car. The weight was too great however, for his brother and he fell to the ground. He struck on his feet but owing to the rate at which the train was traveling he rolled over and over on the rocks which covered the ground.

The alarm was given and the train was stopped and backed up to where the accident occurred. The young man was found lying twenty feet from the track in a semiconscious

condition. The train proceeded at once to Ardmore where the attention of a physician was secured. At Crawford another physician was secured and accompanied the injured man to Alliance where he was taken to St. Joseph's hospital. This morning a careful examination was made and it was found that both knee caps had been dislocated, his right ankle sprained, and the point of one upper vertebra was broken, but the spinal chord was uninjured. Mr. Graham has recovered consciousness and unless complications arise he will probably recover.



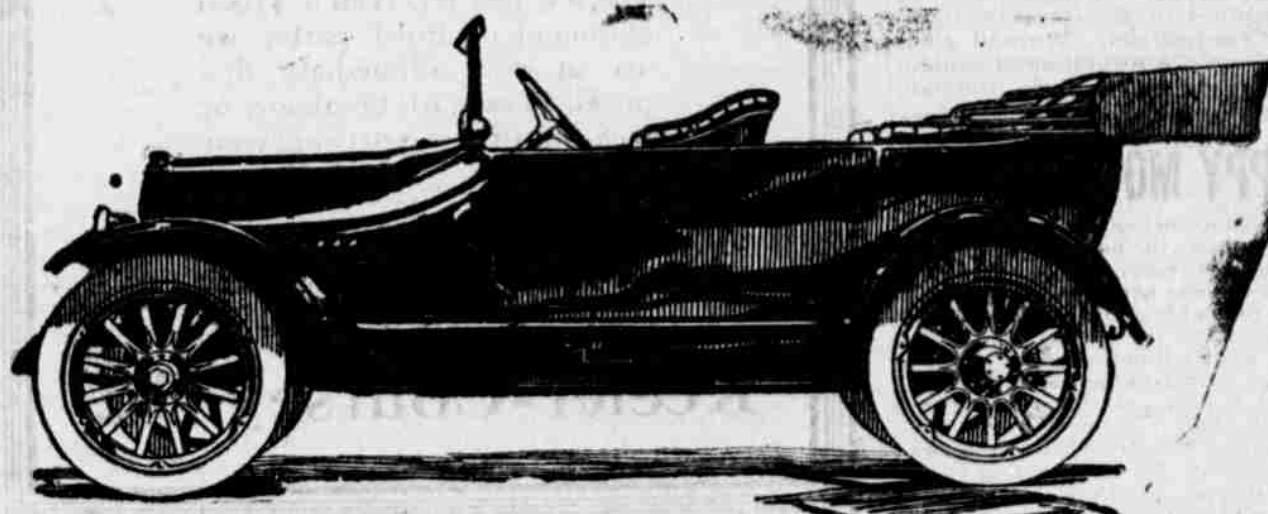
