MATRIMONIAL TIES SEVERED

Divorce Granted and Negro Sentenced at Adjourned Session of Court

The adjourned session of the May term of Box Butte county district court convened at the court house yesterday, Judge W. H. Westover presiding. Two cases were disposed of in short order, the time required being only a few hours.

The divorce case of Alice M. Young vs. Edward E. Young, on the ground of extreme cruelty. Two witnesses only were examined in the case, the complainant and Dr. H. H. Bellwood. The defendant did not appear in court and there were no witnesses in his behalf. Plaintiff was granted divorce and her maiden name, Alice M. Day, restored.

Solly Woods, the negro who shot the two sons of Soney Smith last winter, plead guilty to the charge of shooting with intent to do great bodily injury and was sentenced to a year in the penitentiary.

Up to May 1 there were 74 members and a total of \$1628 raised under the budget system. On May 25 thirteen more members and \$1488 more was raised. On the 27th seven more members and \$532. Up to 11 o'clock this morning four more had been secured and \$77. This gives a total of 98 members and \$2,725 raised under the budget system, pledged its support to the metropolis.

GRASPED WIRE; SEVERELY BURNED

Six Year Old Son of John Hopkins Seriously Injured by Fallen Electric Wire

The six year old son of John Hopkins, living in the south part of Alliance, was severely, perhaps fatally, injured at 8 o'clock Sunday morning, when he grasped an electric cable carrying 2300 volts. The high wind of the evening before had torn the cable from its fastenings and it hung near the ground. The little fellow, with some companions, were playing near the cable. He was told by an older girl that he would be killed if he touched the wire.

One hand and one foot were severely burned by the current which passed through the boy's body. The cable is one which leads to the Reck brick yards south of Alliance, furnishing power to operate machinery there. The voltage is the same that recently killed a lineman in the business section of town.

Although the boy was unconscious for several minutes, he revived and stands a good chance of recovery, although he will bear remembrance of the burns the balance of his life.

MONSTER SHOW DURING MEETING

Commercial Club Has Arranged for Biggest Wild West Show in World for Convention

At a special meeting of the board of directors of the Commercial Club, held Sunday afternoon, Mr. Irwin, representing Irwin Brothers Cheyenne Frontier Days Wild West show, closed a contract agreeing to show in Alliance in connection with the Stockmen's convention, June 17, 18 and 19. The commercial club has put up a heavy guarantee in order to secure the show.

The show will be held at the fair grounds each day, commencing at 1 o'clock in the afternoon. Contests will be held in many different western sports, at which large cash prizes will be offered, open to the world. There will be bucking horse contests for men and for ladies. Wild horse racing by cowboys and ranchmen, open to all. Ladies relay race. Steer roping contests. Bull doffing steer contest, jumping from a running steer's horns and throwing the steer by main strength.

This show has 200 people and uses 27 cars in traveling. It has more champions than all other wild west shows combined. One full band of Sioux Indians, 40 in all, are with the show. The chief of the Sioux, the celebrated Chief White Cloud, will be here with his tribe. There will be two bands and a steam callopo. A grand free street parade will be given on Thursday morning, June 18. The float and automobile parades will be given on the mornings of the 19th and 20th.

M. S. Rowe, general agent, will arrive in his special advertising car with a force of twenty advertising men on June 1, billing all towns within one hundred miles of Alliance. Special railroad rates will be given.
